DISTRICT COURT.

Most of the time since court convened has been taken up by the Conrad-Huffman and McHenry-F. D. & O. R. R. cases. The Conrad-Huffman case occupied all of Tuesday and Wednesday forenoon. The jury was out six hours and decided in giving plaintiff \$275 damages. The jury differed widely as to the amount of damages that should be given Conrad, the first ballot ranging from the lowest \$50 to the highest \$4,000. This throws the heavy costs of the case onto Huffman and Barsby. Their trial on the charge of assault with intent to do great bodily harm, will come off next week. The case of McHenry-F. D. & O. R. R. is one in which McHenry appeals from the decision of the board of appraisers who made an award of damages sustained by the F. D. & O. R. R. passing through the McHenry stock farm adjoining town, and is creating considerable interest.

The following cases have been settled and dismissed: Crawford Co. vs Fred Bucher; Ed Dowry vs John Downy; Standard Brewery Co. vs Broder Peterson; D. Hage Jr. vs Peter Greves.

THE MASON LECTURE.

The lecture on Tuesday evening at the Methodist church by Dr. Mason, secretary of the Freedmen's Aid Society, was largely attended, notwithstanding the inclemency of the weather. Those who were fortunate enough to hear this colored orator from the southland during conference last year, knew that a rare treat awaited them and none were disappointed. The history given by this able man describing from the very beginning what has been accomplished after two hundred and fifty years of slavery, cannot but convince one of the great good and benefits derived since the education of the black race has been begun. Not only the facts which he gave would tend to prove his assertions, but the living proof, showing what has been accomplished in his own individual case is enough to convince the most biased mind. The entire discourse was tinged with humor and kept the audience keenly interested, showing very plainly the great work which has and is being carried on by this great society. The talk throughout was indeed of the best, and none who were fortunate enough to hear Dr. Mason will ever forget the eloquent logic brought forth.

SALOONS ARE CLOSED.

All the saloons in Des Moines were closed yesterday. It is not known how long they will remain so, the saloon men maintaining that they will open again at the expiration of thirty days and will try and secure a new petition of consent during this time. The anti-saloon people on the other hand claim that it will be at least a year before they can be open. They base their belief on the claim that a second petition cannot be legally obtained until after the next general election.

The Anti-Saloon league is very much pleased with their success in closing the Des Moines saloons and the officers announce that they will at once begin a state wide crusade against all saloons now operating under conditions similar to those which prevail there.
