**SOCIETY IN RAGS.**

Poverty is a huge joke—when it is one, when it is not, it is no joke at all, at all. Last night it was a howling farce, a thing to laugh at and make merry over. May it be the nearest approach to the real thing that any of the happy guests at Mr. and Mrs. Philbrook's home ever have to deal with. The more than one hundred invitations issued on Friday caused a commotion. Old wardrobes were overhauled, rag bags reviewed, the clothing houses were besieged for out-of-date hats and ties, and Franz Heppner did a rushing business renting out old cast off shoes at a cigar pair. The guests found the beautiful Philbrook home transformed to an abode of poverty. Lithographs served as curtains, cheap prints decked the walls, broken down furniture abounded, frappe of ice water and lemon peel was served in broken glasses, while the rooms were brilliantly lighted with candles stuck in old bottles. Each newly arriving guest was greeted with peals of laughter as the costumes were the most grotesque ever seen outside the comic opera or a lunatic asylum. Prizes for downright poverty were awarded to Mrs. N. J. Wheeler and Mr. John Kott and they richly deserved them. Mrs. Wheeler with her rag carpet shawl and tattered gown being poverty personified. Mrs. U. G. Johnson as the blind beggar woman with

her accordion was simply immense, fooling everyone as to her identity. Mrs. Johnson and Mr. F. J. Young, whose costume as a poor Chinaman, was equally unique, took first prizes for character sketches. Among the men the costumes of Messrs. Wescott, Kuehne, Wieland, Bradley, Holmes, Sime and Meyers were worthy of note, while among the ladies Mesdames Boyle, Bradley, R. A. Romans, Wescott, Richardson and Philbrook were bright, particular stars. It is unjust to discriminate, however, among so many grotesque makeups. The supper consisted of such luxuries as hot wieners, bread, pickles, ginger bread, doughnuts and coffee, served with wooden plates and tin cups. During the evening the guests were divided into three groups and flash light pictures were taken. Mr. and Mrs. Philbrook are to be credited with giving the most novel and unique entertainment that has been given in Denison these many years.
