**IMPORTED CATTLE.**

We learn that W. E. Cole has been heard from. He arrived at Perth, Scotland where he went in the interest of W. A. McHenry to attend the Aberdeen-Angus sale, arriving three days before the sale, he had a good chance to make selections in a quiet way, which was a great advantage to him on the day of the sale, and in each instance he got the bull he selected. The first one purchased was Proteros, a very highly bred Pride of Aberdeen bull by Diplomat, Dam, Pride of the Farm, bred by Sir T. D. Gibson Carmichael. This family is considered one of the highest bred in Scotland. The second bull bought was the Trojan Erica, Edyrn 16508, bred by Sir George McPherson Grant, Sired by his 800, Guinea bull Bion 11456, Dam Edists, 18702. These bulls were selected from 400 head of pure breeds, an opportunity that is seldom offered. It requires some determination to send a man 5000 miles to buy two animals, but Mr. McHenry is determined to retain the standing that his Premier herd has attained and the infusion of this fresh blood from the parent country will be of incalculable benefit to the herd and to those who may purchase cattle from this herd in the future. Mr. Cole is now on the ocean and the cattle will have to be kept in quarantine in New Jersey three months before they are permitted to come to Denison.

Our community was shocked and grieved this morning to learn of the death of Mr. Richard Mount which occurred at the home of his son Mr. John Mount at 9 a. m.

Mr. Mount was born in Yorkshire, England, Dec. 13, 1829, being in his 72nd year. He came to America 42 years ago and settled in Ohio. After two years in that state he came to Iowa where he has since made his home. His death resulted from an accident which occurred about two weeks ago, at which time he fell down a flight of stairs causing concussion of the brain.

The funeral will be held to-morrow afternoon at 2 o'clock at the First Presbyterian Church. Mr. Mount leaves a loving wife and a son to mourn his loss. He was an industrious highminded citizen, and a man who acted well his part in life.
