Bids Wanted.

Sealed bids will be received by John Harrison, secretary of school board of Hays township, Crawford county, Ia, for the construction of a storm cave at each of the nine school houses in said township, bids closing on April 6, 1900. The specifications of the caves will be as follows:

Hays township, March 19, 1900. We the board of directors of Hays township desire to build a cave for each of the nine school houses, dimensions as follows: 6x10 in the clear; 6 1/2 feet in the clear at center of arch; a trench of 6 inches on side walls with a 12 inch bearing on ground, 2 batters to be used; arch, sides and walls to be 8 inches through with entrance to be the same thickness as inside walls; also to have the brick laid in cement, lime enough used to keep material from setting; the outer side of arch to be plastered over with cement after the setting of arch. The floor of cave to be plastered with cement, also the steps of the entrance to be of brick and plastered over with cement. There is to be two doors, an outer and inner door, the outer door to have lock and key and half to open in opposite directions. Size of inner door to be 2x6x6. The brick used for this work is to be the best hard brick, and the cement the best German Portland. The high point of arch not to be over the surface of the ground. The wall of the cave must be one brick under the surface of the floor. There must be two 2 inch gas pipe ventilators. The lumber used must be the best high grade. Two inch material for frame work. The time is limited to June 1st to complete these caves. The acceptance or rejection of this work will be at the discretion of the board. The board reserves the right to reject any and all bids.
