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## REPUBLICAN VICTORY

Capture the Entire Ticket Except Treasurer.

WILSON WINS BY 5 VOTES

Mr. Carey's Popularity and Political Experience Carry Him Ahead.

## A REPUBLICAN COUNCIL

The Council for the Coming Year is all Republican—A Good Natured Election Well Fought by the Different Candidates—Official Returns as Canvassed by the Election Board.

The city election of 1900 is a thing of the past. Yesterday was an ideal election day and early in the morning voters and candidates were on the alert, and it was plainly to be seen that there was to be a close contest. From the mayor down—all were working and friends of the different candidates were on the go. The polls were opened at eight o'clock and then the race was on. There were about the average number of votes cast up until near the noon hour, when the workings of the outsiders began to tell. In the afternoon carriages began to appear, questions as to where this man was, or is so and so in town, were on the tongues of the workers. According to the new law, just enacted by the legislature, the polls were kept open until 7 p. m. and consequently a number voted who otherwise would have lost their vote. During the afternoon it was not an easy matter to figure out just who would win on the head of the ticket. Mr. Wilson is a worker and was here, there and everywhere, while Mr. Wheeler did considerable work on the quiet. There were in all about 600 votes cast, polling a few votes short of last year. Mr. Carey's popularity coupled with his experience as a politician, won for him many votes. In Mr. Plimpton the laboring men had a true friend. They knew their city warrants were as good as cash for face value anywhere. At times when the city finances were low Mr. Plimpton wrote his own personal check for the amount. A laboring man could take his warrant to any store in town and it would be taken for its full amount, the merchants knowing Mr. Plimpton was behind it.

For solicitor, Mr. McLennan had an easy victory, there was no fear as to his election at any time during the day. Mr. Bond had the younger votes to fight against and his victory is a credit to him and his ability as an assessor. The real hard fight for alderman was made in the third ward although both candidates in the second were confident of success. Mr. Sime had been unable to do much work owing to the absence of his brother which necessitated his attending more closely to his business. If he had had the time he would easily have beaten his opponent by 20 or 25 votes. Mr. Schnoor was on the ground early and worked hard all day, rallying his forces in at the last, but not quite large enough in number.

Both Mr. Hagenow and Mr. Brown had carries out for their friends and it was for a time nip and tuck as to who would win. Taking all in all the election was the most good natured and peaceful one ever held, there was no betting and it was entirely free from rowdiness and boisterousness. The new officers will be sworn in on next Tuesday.

## NEW DEPOT A BEAUTY

Illinois Central Depot Dedicated to the Use of Its Patrons Saturday.

### STRUCTURE COST \$20,000

Is a Model of Architecture, Beauty and Elegance—Has Every Modern Convenience and Is Much Appreciated.

Agent Gastner is now comfortably located in the new I. C. depot. The finishing touches were put on Saturday and everything moved from the two box cars which have been serving as depot and baggage room into the new building that night. To say that the building is a beauty does not half express it. Geo. B. Swift & Co. of Chicago are the contractors and are the same firm that are now erecting the one at Council Bluffs. The work has been done under the supervision of M. F. Nugent, who deserves much credit for the thorough manner in which it was done. At first some inferior material was shipped here, but all work was stopped until the proper material arrived. The building is of pressed brick, stone foundation, slate roof, etc., and is finished on the inside with white oak and the walls are of hard finish. The first room on the south end is for the express and is very neat and well arranged. The next is the ladies' waiting room which is certainly very fine, and a model of neatness and comfort. The office is on the west side and here every thing is arranged perfectly. A hallway leads from the ladies' waiting room to the men's waiting room on the north side. This room is the same as the ladies' in size, etc. The baggage room is on the extreme north end and communication can be had with the baggage master by means of a window in the men's waiting room avoiding the necessity of going out of doors to have baggage checked. The whole building is lighted with electricity and heated with steam, and is complete with toilet rooms, etc. Taken in all it is a building that would be a credit to a city several times the size of Denison and that the people appreciate the kindness of the I. C. in building such a beautiful depot here is shown by the liberal patronage daily given this new line.
