## WILL PLAY A PLAY.

Local Talent Aided by Professionals Will Don the Buskin.

### WILL BE GIVEN SOON.

Woodmen of the World Interested.—Money Will go to Log Rolling Fund.—Rehearsals Have Commenced.

Assisted by Mr. Russell and Miss Dora Swearingen a company of home players will give a drama entitled "Aberdeen" at the opera house in the near future. Mr. Russell is the author of the play which deals with village life in Ohio and some of the stirring events of the Cuban war. The cast of characters promises to be a strong one and it is felt that one of the best amateur productions ever given in Denison will result. The proceeds go toward the "Log Rolling" fund of the Woodmen of the World and the entertainment will be given under their auspices. On June 7th it is expected that their will be more than a thousand women in Denison to participate in the Log Rolling. To entertain such large numbers is no easy task and the receipts of the play will be given toward this object.

### CITY DADS CONFER.

An Interesting Session Held on Tuesday Evening.

The second meeting of the new council was held on Tuesday evening at which time much important business was conducted. All members were present.

The first matter taken up was the granting the privilege of using Washington Park to Mr. E. A. Stone, for the purpose of Campmeeting. Mr. Stone was present and offered to put up a bond that the grounds would not be damaged in any way and would be cleaned up when leaving. His meeting takes place June 1 to 10. Another matter of importance was taken into consideration, the fixing of the grade on Court street. The Council held a special meeting Wednesday and went to view this street. A new six foot walk will be laid through to the Central, which will be a decided improvement over the present one.

The subject of mounting and placing the captured canon was next taken up and discussed pro and con. It was finally decided to place it in front of the City hall, and a committee was appointed to arrange for mounting. The standing committees for the ensuing year were appointed by the Mayor and are made as follows: Water committee, Johnson, Sime and Faus; Street committee, Luney, Sime and Johnson; Health committee, Wright, Faus and Brown; Finance committee, Sime, Johnson and Brown; Park and buildings committee, Wright and Luney.

The city scales have not been paying more than half the weighmaster's salary for some time and it was decided best to abandon the office for the present. Of course if at any time in the future it is deemed wise to again open the scales to the public, arrangements will be made to do so.

A friendly and good natured discussion took place regarding the appointment of a street commissioner. Under an old ordinance the Mayor has the power, but according to the 1897 Code the street commissioner is elected by the council. A motion was made that council proceed to the election of street commissioner. There were four candidates in the field and on the formal ballot Mr. Wm. Gilbreath received a majority and was declared elected. Mr. Gilbreath will make a good officer, he has had plenty of experience, goes ahead himself, understands the grader thoroughly and is therefore capable in every way to fill the place. After allowing a few bills the council adjourned.

The board of supervisors has completed the arduous task of canvassing the saloon petition. The work was conscientiously done and the names left are undoubtedly bona fide. The petition cost the liquor dealers several hundred dollars and the county quite a bit as well.

It will be noticed in the board proceedings published elsewhere that the county has already paid out more than \$400 in extra attorneys fees which would have been saved to the county had an experienced county attorney been elected. ### THE REPUBLICAN COUNTY CONVENTION.
