**SHOOTING AT DUNLAP**

E. H. Barrett is Seriously Wounded by His Assailant.

**FOUR SHOTS ARE FIRED.**

A. B. Taylor, Frenzied Because His Daughter is Not Re-Elected Teacher, Does the Shooting.

DUNLAP, IA., May 14.

A sensation, which enacted surprise and astonishment, took place in this city Saturday forenoon about 9.30, when A. B. Taylor fired four shots at E. H. Barrett, two of which took one in the left leg at the rear and above the knee, and the other on the right leg, in front in the region of the groin. Both bullets passed out, leaving painful, though not necessarily dangerous, flesh wounds. Taylor was immediately placed under arrest, taken before Justice Lawson who placed him under bonds of \$5,000 for his appearance on Monday morning. Taylor's condition was such that no effort was attempted to secure the bonds and he was taken to Logan and placed in charge of Sheriff Skelton Saturday afternoon.

Monday morning he was returned to Dunlap for trial, but waiving examination, was bound over to the grand jury in the sum of \$8,000, his attorneys, Roadifer and Cochran, advising that no attempt be made to secure bonds until the condition of Mr. Barrett was found to be favorable, and he is again in the hands of the sheriff.

The trouble grew out of a recent school election, in which Mr. Taylor's daughter, Grace, was defeated, her defeat being charged by Taylor to the influence of Barrett. Ill feeling is said to have existed between the men for some time, and various threats are alleged to have been made. The blow falls heavily upon the family of Mr. Taylor, the wife and children standing high in the estimation of the people here. The unfortunate episode is the result of a whisky-addled brain and nothing more for in his sober moments Taylor is a good citizen and careful and accurate business man, having for years held the secretaryship of the school board and assessorship of the city, besides having conducted an insurance business.

In justice to the people of Dunlap your correspondent desires to refute the charge of the staff correspondent of the Omaha World-Herald wherein he said mob violence was narrowly averted, etc. This statement was rankly unjust and reflects discredit on the sober minded and law abiding people of Dunlap. No such sentiment was expressed and the people of this city brand the article as infamous and misleading.

**IS STRICTLY FIRST-CLASS**

Beautiful Music Enthusiastically Greeted by Denison's Music Lovers—A High Grade Performance.

The most striking feature of the Logan concert and recital given last night at the opera house under the auspices of the Presbyterian choir, was the uniform artistic value of each number. The audience was small, but it was made up of the genuine music lovers of the city and their hearty applause and encores of each selection were the highest encomiums of excellence which Denison could bestow.

Mr. Walter G. Logan proved himself a violinist of the first order. Under his touch the strings become living sentient things, each filled with the soul of melody. The solos by Mrs. J. N. Bradley were exceptionally good. Mrs. Bradley is one of the finest singers it has been our pleasure to hear. Her voice is rich and melodious and has a freshness and vigor of life and feeling that is well nigh incomparable. It is always a genuine delight to hear her sing. Miss Ley rendered a piano solo which was enthusiastically encored. Although a young lady Miss Ley shows an insight into the true value of the composer's work which speaks most highly of her artistic ability.

The duets by two of Denison's prime musical favorites, Miss Garrison and Miss Terry were most cordially received. Their voices blend most harmoniously and they sing with understanding and feeling. The solemn "Hush, Hush My Soul" as rendered by them was impressive and beautiful.

It would not do, to speak of this concert without mentioning Miss Agnes King who acted as accompanist. The accompanist has the most unobtrusive part of the program, but upon her understanding and ability very largely depends the success of the program. In Miss King Denison has a musician, not a common organist or pianist, but a musician. The concert, as a whole would have done credit to any city in the land. The light attendance was caused by the inclement weather, but still more by the cloud of sorrow hanging over the church and over all our people on account of the death of Mrs. Samuel Luney.

State Committee Approves Denison's Course of Study.

**STATE COLLEGES ARE OPEN**

To Denison High School Graduates Without Conditions. A Step in Advance.

Supt. Failor is in receipt of the following letter which will be good news to the patrons of our public schools.

From the Committee on Secondary School Relations of the College Department of the Iowa State Teachers' Association.

IOWA CITY, IOWA, May 1, 1900.  
MR. H. V. FAILOR, Supt. of Schools, Denison, Iowa.

Dear Sir: As the Recorder of the Committee on Secondary School Relations of the Iowa State Teacher's Association (College Department), I have the honor to inform you that in accordance with a recent action of the Committee, the Denison High School is accredited for the ensuing year as making full preparation in its General course for one or more courses of the several Colleges of the Association, which are: The State University of Iowa, Iowa College (Grinnell), Cornell College, Drake University, Parsons, Coe, Penn, Taber, Luther, Simpson, Western Colleges, Upper Iowa University, Iowa Wesleyan University and the Iowa Agricultural College at Ames.

A copy of our analysis of your course of study is sent with a copy of this notice to the Superintendent of the City Schools. Pupils of the Denison High School who present Certificates signed by the Principal or the Superintendent, stating that the work accredited as indicated in our analysis has been successfully completed, will be admitted to the Freshman class without any other condition than such as may be required of all candidates for admission and which may be found clearly outlined in the respective catalogues in connection with the accredited list as published by each College. Blanks for the required detailed statements of work may be obtained from the President of the College the student desires to enter and should always be returned by September 1, of the year of matriculation.

**A REMARKABLE BRIDGE,**

Northwestern's Structure Over Des Moines River a Great Contract.

The statement is made by Engineer Armstrong, who has charge of the construction of the new steel bridge for the Northwestern road across the Des Moines river between Boone and Ogdan, by which the distance between these places is to be reduced four miles and the danger of the Des Moines river hills removed, that his effort will compare well with the big bridges of the world. The total length is 2,685 feet, or forty-five feet more than half a mile. The height above the water line is 185 feet. The embankment at the end of the bridge is protected by a massive wall of masonry work. When the bridge is completed a hand rail four and one-half feet high will run along the top of either side of the double track for the entire length.

While the others are higher, yet none are so long. The others only carry one railroad track, while this carries two. The three bridges described in comparison are: The Kinzua bridge on the New York Lake Erie and Western, in Pennsylvania, built in 1882; the Loa bridge, in Bolivia, South America, built in 1889; and the Pecos river bridge in Texas, built in 1892.

The total cost of the steel work is estimated at \$450,000, while the cost of the foundation is placed at about \$150,000. This will make the cost of the bridge in round figures \$600,000. The total cost of the short line, including the bridge, will not be far from a million.
