FAILOR WILL LEAVE

Superintendent of Schools Tenders His Resignation.

HE WILL STUDY LAW.

A Splendid Educator Whom Denison People Regret To Lose.—Best Wishes For His Future Success.

On Tuesday evening Supt. H. V. Failor tendered his resignation to Mr. E. S. Plimpton, president of the school board. He had but recently been re-elected for the ensuing year and his resignation was a great disappointment to the board, as well as to the patrons of the schools.

Mr. Failor has greatly endeared himself to all as one of the best educators and one of the truest and most brave-hearted and earnest christian young men of the community. While the board will accept his resignation only with regret, there is no thought but that Mr. Failor has acted in entire good faith, and one and all wish him success in his new line of work.

Mr. Failor informs us that during the summer he will represent the International Encyclopedia in different parts of the state, will teach during the county normal of Monona county, and in the fall will enter the Law Department of the State University of Nebraska. His decision to enter the Nebraska institution is not made on account of any prejudice against Iowa's University, but on account of the fact that he has two brothers practicing law in Lincoln and that he will not only be near them, but will also have the benefit of their libraries. Mrs. Failor will remain in Denison during the summer, but will join her husband at Lincoln in the fall. We might forgive Mr. Failor for going, but it is hard to forgive his taking from Denison one of the most charming and intelligent of its daughters.

It is useless to wish this young couple success. They are the kind of people who make a success of everything they do. In our last issue, not knowing of Mr. Failor's intended resignation, we said "indeed, we should regard it as a public calamity to lose Mr. Failor from our schools." The calamity has befallen us.

The school board is now looking out for a good man to take Mr. Failor's place and it is to be hoped that it will succeed, as no position in our city is of greater importance to the people of the community. The following is Mr. Failor's resignation:

The Resignation. DENISON, IA., May 15th, 1900 Denison School Board,

DEAR SIRS:—It is with much regret that I herewith tender my resignation of the superintendency of schools for next year. In justice to myself I must state that my application for the position was made in all sincerity, recent considerations have, however, led to a change in my plans.

I desire to express my sincerest gratitude for the most cordial support you have at all times given me. Our relations have been uniformly pleasant and harmonious and I recognize the fact that to this spirit of co-operation, and to the spirit of unity in the board itself is largely due the signal advance the Denison schools have made during the past four years.
