A NEW WELL. Council Decides to Dig a New Well Similar to Old One.

The city council met in special session on Thursday evening, the object of the meeting being the question of water. The demand for water is constantly increasing, and the only solution seems to be another well. The subject was thoroughly considered and a committee was appointed to get specifications, decide on location and advertise for bids, the council deeming it wise to let the job by contract. The old well was built by the day, and it is believed one can be built by contract much cheaper. However, the outlay in money will be in the neighborhood of from \$1800 to \$2,000. There were also present at this meeting representatives of the Electric Light & Power Co., and a new water main leading direct from the pumping station to the standpipe was asked for. The company claims that the present main is very unsatisfactory, there are many joints and turns in it, and it is the belief that in many of these corners the pipe is half filled with clay and gravel, thereby causing great friction and making pumping very hard. This is a question that has been agitated more or less by the company for some time, but the city council is of the opinion that to get the water first and the pumping afterwards is the main object and are not willing at this period to spend \$2500 or \$3,000 for a new main. No action was taken on the question and the council adjourned.

NOTICE. DENISON, IOWA, July 2nd, 1900. To the Township Trustees and Road Supervisors of Crawford County, Ia. The legislature at its last session repealed the former law relating to the cutting of weeds along the highway and its stead enacted the following:

"Sec. 1. It shall be the duty of road supervisors to cause to be cut, near the surface, all weeds on the public roads in their respective districts, between the 15th day of July and the 15th day of August in each year. But nothing herein shall prevent the land owner from harvesting the grass grown upon the roads along his land in the proper season."

As will be seen from a reading of the above it is part of the duty of the supervisor to attend to this matter, and as the repeal of the old law does away with the provision for taxing the cost of cutting up to the property owner, the cost now will be at the expense of the district. This new law makes it absolutely the duty of the road supervisor and does not make any provision for the land owner doing it. This act is in effect this year.
