The attention of the District Road Supervisors is called to a notice signed by J. T. Carey, Auditor, in regard to the cutting of weeds. Section 1 of the Code of Iowa says: "It shall be the duty of road supervisors to cause to be cut, near the surface, all weeds on the public roads in their respective districts, between the 15th day of July and the 15th day of August in each year. But nothing herein shall prevent the land owner from harvesting the grass grown upon the roads along his land in the proper season." Under the new law the cost of cutting weeds along the highway is not taxed against abutting property but is added to the expense of the district.
