

ROBT THEOBALD DEAD

Many Mourn the Death of a Faithful Citizen.

A NOBLE LIFE SUDDENLY ENDED.

The Funeral Will Be Held To-Day at 2:30 o'clock From the Home Conducted by Rev. Cable Assisted by Rev. Allen of Manilla.

Robert Theobald was born April 10, 1819, at Norfolk, England. When but a lad he moved with his parents to Prince Edward's Island, where he lived until 1847, when he moved to Iowa county, Wisconsin, and from there to Crawford county, Iowa, in 1871, where he has since been a resident.

His second marriage was consummated in Iowa county, Wisconsin, to Miss Isabelle Bernard, who was born on Prince Edward's Island, and to them seven children were born: Mrs. Ed. 
John Goff and Henry Meeves are among those who are in attendance at the shooting tournament at Arnold's Park.
