

## IT IS CONNER AND LALLY.

The New Law Firm Just Announced

### A STRONG LEGAL COMBINATION

Congressman J. P. Conner and Hon. P. E. C. Lally unite their legal practice. Will make an effective firm.

The announcement is made this week of the new legal firm of Conner and Lally. The formation of this firm does not come entirely as a surprise as it was known that Judge Conner would be obliged to make some arrangement for the carrying on of his legal business during his congressional absences and it was felt that no better or stronger combination could be made than between these two strong lawyers who although opposed to each other in so many causes before the courts have always maintained the warmest personal friendship.

The union of these two, each having a large and lucrative practice, creates one of the very strongest firms in western Iowa and makes Denison a legal as well as a banking and business center. It also takes from the field one competing firm and thus adds to the business of every other lawyer in Denison.

Judge Conner has had a remarkable career as an attorney in Denison. Coming here a poor young man, driven almost to despair by the first long months of waiting as a briefless barrister, he gradually forged to the front. Later he entered a partnership with the now great Governor of Iowa and the firm of Conner and Shaw soon became noted throughout the western part of the state. After being elected judge Mr. Conner of course retired from active practice but assumed it again when his term expired. Judge Conner made a splendid judicial officer but he was too aggressive in his nature to enjoy the quiet of the bench. ## IS SHOT IN THE ARM

Frank Howard Stops Bullet From Christy's Gun.

### THREATENS TO BE QUITE SERIOUS

Domestic Infelicities Result in A Shooting Scrape With Serious Consequences. Mrs. Howard Slightly Injured.

There has been trouble in the Howard family for some time which culminated some two weeks ago when Howard was given a ten days sentence for wife beating. We do not know, nor would we wish to discuss, the merits of the case. On Saturday Howard and his daughter went to the Christy home where Mrs. Howard had been staying since her trouble with her husband. What happened there is told in conflicting stories by those interested. Howard demanded that his wife and family go home with him. His wife refused to go and Christy interfered with a revolver the ball passing through the fleshy part of Mrs. Howard's arm and lodging in Howard's forearm inflicting a serious injury which may result in his losing the use of his left hand and wrist entirely. At Howard's instance a warrant was issued for Christy's arrest and he was given a preliminary hearing this morning before Mayor Wilson.

Squire Montgomery decided to hold Mr. Christy to await the action of the grand jury. Under the circumstances we shall have little to say concerning the verdict, nevertheless it was the almost unanimous opinion of those who heard the testimony that Mr. Christy should have been discharged.


