John Roy, of Dow City, Accidentally Killed.

# STRUCK BY A FAST FREIGHT.

Skull Crushed and He Dies in a Few Hours No Blame Attached to Railroad.

We sadly regret to chronicle the death of John Roy, who was struck by an engine on the Chicago & North Western road last Tuesday evening about five o'clock and died three hours after being hurt.

We cannot say whose place it was to put out the switch lights, whosever place it was. It appears that occasionally they would let John put them out, most of the time his young brother would go with him. The reason of this is that John is subject to fits, and was liable to take one and fall down wherever he happened to be. It seems this time his brother was late, and John took the light and started for the west switch and as he drew near it, he must of taken one of his spells, for eye witnesses to the sad affair, say he acted very strangely and made motions with the light as if signaling a train. As there was a train coming from the west, a meat train that goes by about 5 p. m. After motioning with the switch light for a short time he sat down on the end of a tie on the side track, but so near the main line as to be in reach of the engine as it bore down upon him. As the train drew near him, the engineer blew the whistle, and as he made no effort to get out of the way the engineer shut off the steam and ran by the depot before the train stopped.


