

## DR. WRIGHT IS INJURED

Dragged By Runaway Team.  
He Lies In The Cold  
All Night.

NOT FOUND UNTIL THIS MORNING.

His Hip Dislocated. Cold And Exposure May Bring Serious Complications. The Doctor Shows Splendid Nerve.

Almost stiff with cold and exposure Dr. W. T. Wright was found early this morning lying by the roadside near the Illinois Central right of way about three miles west of Denison. In the early light the section men under foreman Schurke saw his form lying beside his buggy while his team was tied to a nearby fence. The men hastened to his aid and soon they were joined by Leighton Wright who was out in search of his brother. A man was sent to town for a wagon and stretcher and the doctor was soon at home receiving the best care possible. Last evening at 10:30 o'clock Dr. Wright was called to Arion by Dr. W. B. Evans. He started immediately but at 1 o'clock Dr. Evans telephoned asking why he did not come. Mrs. Wright answered that he had started an hour and a half earlier and as she could not account for the fact that he had not reached Arion she asked Dr. Evans to telephone again if he did not arrive in half an hour. For some reason this was not done and it was morning before Mrs. Wright learned that the doctor had not reached Arion and his brother Leighton was sent in search of him.

The account of the accident as told by Dr. Wright this morning is that as he was driving west before crossing the Northwestern track near the gravel pit one of his horses became frightened by a plow standing near the road. The team ran wildly, nearly upsetting the buggy and Dr. Wright attempted to jump out. In doing this his foot caught in the reins and he was dragged over the rough roads and over the



Finally the team stopped and the Doctor, who had not lost consciousness through all his wild ride, dragged himself to his feet, unhitched the team and tied them to the fence. Overcome by pain and exhaustion he went back to his buggy and being unable to drag himself into it, laid down by the roadside hoping each moment that some belated traveler might find him or that his friends would come in search. Eight hours he laid in the cold, conscious at all times, and waiting for help. It is too early at this time to tell what will be the effect of the terrible night of exposure and pain but Dr. Wright's thousands of friends throughout the county will anxiously await tidings of his recovery. Dr. Wright is a careless driver but fond of spirited horses and he had many times been warned by his friends to beware of a runaway accident. He has always been a faithful practitioner and no call has been too distant, no roads too bad, no night too dark for him to respond to the call of duty. Let us all hope for his speedy and complete recovery.

Later—This afternoon we learn that the physicians found upon examination that Dr. Wright's hip was not dislocated as was first thought. His back and limbs are badly lacerated, gravel was driven into the flesh by the force of his dragging at the heels of the runaways. He is bleeding quite severely but it is thought that there is no danger but that he will recover.
