### THAT COOK BOOK.

The Review job rooms are busily engaged on the Friday Club cook book and the editor has been reading proof until he knows all about cooking and has applied for the position of chef at Delmonico's. Some of the receipts linger in our mind although we may not have them exactly right. We learn that a good vegetable soup sufficient for one man and two boys can easily be made something as follows. Remove the label from one-half can of early June tomatoes, boil for four hours, being careful that fire does not go out, add the whites of two beaten eggs, use one teaspoonful white flour for thickening, add soup stock to taste. When soup is consistency of thin paste put in raw potatoes cut in dice, a little corn, beans, peas, pieplant, spinach, sliced radishes, rice, sago, cauliflower, cabbage, beet tops, spinach and parsley. Season to taste and serve hot. This soup may be eaten at the point of a revolver, otherwise it is best to leave it alone.

The cook book will contain more than two hundred receipts from the best cooks in Denison, and Denison beats the band when it comes to good cooking. The books will be bound in oilcloth for kitchen purposes but will be neat and attractive and will make a splendid holiday gift.
