

# THE MONUMENT UNVEILED

The W. O. W. Unveil Monument to Sov. F. E. Sperry. WAS AN IMPRESSIVE CEREMONY.

Monument in Boone Cemetery Unveiled in Presence of Large Crowd. Denison Woodmen Perform Their Part Well.

Yesterday the Denison Camp of the W. O. W. by its representatives unveiled the monument erected in Boone in memory of their fellow Sovereign, F. E. Sperry. The unveiling was a joint affair between the camps of Denison and Boone. The Boone camp unveiled a monument to Sovereign Sundstrom of that place and both ceremonies were carried out with a dignity and solemnity befitting the occasion. Preceded by the Boone band the Woodmen marched to the cemetery, a large number of interested friends and citizens accompanied them. The first ceremony was at the monument of Sovereign Sundstrom and was conducted by the officers of the Boone camp. The Woodmen then proceeded to the grave of Sovereign Sperry where the ceremony was repeated. Mr. A. R. Hill as acting Consul Commander performed his duties exceptionally well and all the Denison Woodmen sustained their parts with credit. Mr. F. W. Meyers pronounced the eulogy at the grave of Sov. Sperry.
