NEBRASKA BOYS BEATEN.

Minnesota Wins Stubborn and Well Contested Game.

FINAL RECORD IS 20 TO 12.

Feature of the Game Was a Remarkable Run by Pillsbury-Tie Game Played by Iowa and Northwestern University Elevens at Rock Island. Lincoln, Neb., Nov. 30.—Minnesota defeated Nebraska in a stubborn and well contested football game yesterday before a crowd that broke the record in point of attendance. The score was 20 to 12. Minnesota set the pace, scoring a touchdown in the first 12 minutes of play. Another touchdown came to the visitors ten minutes later. Then Nebraska braced up and on a false punt and beautiful run by Pillsbury scored a touchdown and goal. A place kick by Minnesota ended the first half. IOWANS FAIL OF VICTORY.

Contest With the Northwestern Eleven Results in a Tie. Rock Island, Nov. 30.—The game between Northwestern university and the State university of Iowa, played here yesterday, did not decide the rival claims of the elevens to the football championship of the west, the score being 5 to 5 at the close of a heart-breaking contest. The game was witnessed by 8,000 people. While the score was a tie the honors of the day were with Northwestern. The latter kicked off, Iowa carrying the ball back to the 40-yard line. An exciting contest followed, line and mass plays being interspersed with punting by both teams when they found it impossible to advance. Iowa twice tried a place kick, which each time resulted in a touchdown. After 20 minutes' play Iowa punted from center field, Northwestern carried the ball back to the 65-yard line, when Ely captured the ball on a fumble and, backed by splendid interference, sprinted to Northwestern's goal for a touchdown. The second half was a repetition of the first. Contrary to expectations, Northwestern showed no weakening from the effects of the battering received. Both teams played fast, aggressive ball, without a decided advantage for either. Iowa made considerable gains by several fake punts and plays around the end, but they were outplayed by Northwestern. After 25 minutes' play Johnson made a place kick from the 35-yard line and the ball sailed squarely between the goal posts defended by Iowa, tying the score.
