BAILY OBJECTS TO JUDGE CONNER

The Bourbon Leader Raises Technicality to Keep Conner Out.

OUR CONGRESSMAN HAS NOT YET BEEN ADMITTED

Democratic Scheme to Cheat Tenth Iowa District of Its Representation. Conner Will Soon Be Seated However in Spite of Mr. Baily of Texas.

Judge J. P. Conner did not receive the oath of office on Monday as was expected. When he was about to be sworn in, Baily, the discredited democratic leader of the House entered objection and speaker Henderson was obliged to ask our Congressman to step aside until the matter could be settled. It may be several days before Judge Conner can take the seat to which he was elected by 15,000 majority. The following from the Associated Press tells the story of the trifling technicality brought up to thwart the will of the people.

Mr. Baily of Texas condemned the form of the resignation of Representative Dolliver. He said he doubted the right of a member to resign at a future fixed date. He said he would not raise the point formally, but merely called attention to it so that in the future it could not be used as a precedent.

Mr. Dolliver's resignation, he said had been tendered to take effect December 1, so that Mr. Conner had been elected to fill a vacancy that did not exist at the time of election. He cited a court decision to show that a resignation to take effect at a future date was not a resignation in fact, but simply a notification of a resignation to be made in the future. Mr. Baily said he did not desire to press the matter, but desired the protest to be filed.

The speaker stated that inasmuch as objection had been made Mr. Conner would step aside until the protest had been disposed of.

Baily's action was wholly unexpected and raises a point which, from present appearances, can be got around only by a special election called by the governor to decide who shall represent the district until the 4th of March. It is conceded that the validity of Conner's election to the Fifty-seventh congress is not in question. The unexpected movement of Mr. Baily temporarily disconcerted the republicans and no course of action had been decided on when the house adjourned. The speaker was too preoccupied with other matters to pay any attention to the case.

The leading lawyers and parliamentarians on the republican side are considering the question. In all probability it will be referred to the judiciary committee for an early report.

Gov. Shaw will arrive in Washington next week, accompanied by Adj. Gen. Byers, Secretary of State Dobson and curator of the state historical museum Chas. Aldrich. It is probable that nothing of importance will be done in the case until his arrival, unless the house decides it can get around Mr. Baily's objection in a legal way, failing in which, the governor will be asked to call a special election. Baily disclaims any partisan interest in the matter, and claims he is actuated by a desire not to permit this case to stand as a precedent for action.

DEATH OF MRS. GRIFFIN.

(Special from Dow City.) Mrs. Emma L. Griffin, wife of J. R. Griffin, died of heart disease very suddenly at her home two miles southwest of Dow City, Iowa, Monday evening, December 3.

Mrs. Griffin was born near Dow City, and was thirty-four years, six months, and three days old, she was a daughter of Mr. and Mrs. John R. Rudd, and a sister of A. H. Rudd, editor of the Dow City Enterprise. She leaves a husband and four children to mourn her loss, two daughters, aged fifteen and ten, and twin boys four years old. This makes the third death in uncle Rudd's family out of nine children, all grown to man and womanhood near Dow City. This is indeed a sad loss to our community. A few years ago Mr. Griffin bought what is known as the Robert Butterworth farm and by good hard work and careful management was getting along well, and now to have the good wife and kind mother taken away so suddenly is sad indeed for the little household. The funeral services will be held at the house on Wednesday, at 2 P. M.

HIGH BRED CALVES.

What Can Be Done With High Bred Calves.

Hogan Brothers of Manchester, Iowa, have for several years made a business of feeding calves, and on 10 to 12 months feed they make them weigh between 1100 and 1200 pounds. They always top the market with them. At present they have 260 calves on feed. Mr. H. P. Ruffcorn of Defiance, Iowa, fed 17 calves the summer just passed and sold them in Chicago about three weeks ago for \$5.55. They weighed 1120 lbs. in Chicago.

The following is quoted from Monday's Journal Stockman of So. Omaha: Frank Stocking, a rising young farmer of Wahoo, marketed the nicest string of cattle on today's market two loads of steers and heifers, about half and half, for which Armour paid \$5.30. Mr. S. raised these cattle, which were good grades, Short-horn and black Polls, on his range near Alliance, putting them into his feed yards at Wahoo last January, when they were 380-lb calves. Two hundred and fifty head were put on feed and this is the first shipment made from the bunch. Today's weight, 1,001 lbs. was very satisfactory to the owner and the condition of the cattle showed plainly that Mr. S., although young in years, is a past master in the art of preparing stock for the slaughterer.
