### WASHINGTON LETTER.

SPECIAL TO THE REVIEW.

The news item which will be of general interest to the 10th district people is the fact, that Congressman Conner delivered his maiden speech on the floor of the house of representatives last Friday. This was the day devoted to the consideration and passage of private pension bills in the house, and among others was a bill introduced by Judge Conner granting a pension of fifty dollars (\$50) per month to Major A. J. Holmes, a most worthy citizen of Boone, Iowa. The Judge had successfully piloted this bill through the various red-tape stages of the pension committee, and it being such a deserving case, he was bound it should be passed. Consequently when it came up Friday in the house for final action he saw at once, by the way in which the democrats were objecting, that a last brave effort must be made. Catching the speaker's eye at an opportune moment, he got possession of the floor and made an earnest and eloquent plea for the passage of his bill. So well did he speak that at the conclusion of his remarks not a single objection was heard, and the bill securing to Major Holmes a pension of fifty dollars per month for the rest of his life went through successfully. This splendid achievement on the part of Mr. Conner may seem a small affair to some people compared to the passage of the larger bills in which some state or the entire country is interested, but when it is considered that so many private pension bills are being turned down on account of the lateness of the session and on account also, of the growing sentiment among democrats against such bills, then the full measure of his success in this instance can be better appreciated. The judge's first speech was commented upon most favorably by many of his colleagues and friends.

The second series of delightful receptions given by Mrs. Conner in conjunction with the wives of nine other congressmen, all of whom are stopping at the Hamilton Hotel, was held in the parlors of the hotel last Wednesday afternoon, the same ladies being in the receiving line. The parlors being tastefully decorated with flowers and palms, the prevailing colors in decoration being red and green. Refreshments were served as before by some of the young ladies of the hotel in one of the back parlors. Among the many callers were the wives of nearly all the United States Senators. Over 200 cards were left for Mrs. Conner alone.

Last Saturday night Hon. Lot Thomas of the eleventh district and Mrs. Thomas gave a dinner at the Dewey Hotel to the members of the Iowa delegation and their wives. A most enjoyable evening was spent by all.

The following invitation has been received by Congressman and Mrs. Conner, and were issued by Hon. J. A. T. Hull, chairman of the committee on military affairs, to all the members of the Iowa delegation and to many other Iowa people:

In accordance with a resolution passed by the Commercial exchange of Des Moines, a sword has been purchased for Capt. Robley D. Evans, U. S. N. The presentation of this sword will take place at his residence, No. 324 Indiana Ave., at 8:30 p. m. on the 20th inst. Yourself and wife are cordially invited to be present."

This will undoubtedly be an interesting occasion and a social event of some moment in Iowa circles. Many Iowa people who have the highest regard for our "Fighting Bob", and who will remember with just pride the record he made while Captain of the famous battleship Iowa, will be glad to learn that this mark of high appreciation is to be shown him. The sword itself is a "thing of beauty" and the memory of the way in which he received it will probably prove a "joy forever" to the redoubtable "Bob" in spite of the war-like character of the gift itself.

Last Friday, Congressman Conner appeared before the house committee on public building, and made an earnest speech in favor of a public building which he is trying to obtain for Boone, Iowa. He reports having met with some encouragement, although many of the members of this committee are opposed to any further appropriations in this direction this session. The people of Boone, however, may rest assured that if they fail to secure this coveted recognition from the committee on public buildings this time, it will certainly not be because of any lack of diligent effort and ability on the part of Judge Conner, who has labored very faithfully in their behalf.

During these latter days of the session one can hear most every phase of extra session talk. The senator or congressman, who is anxious to get home, because of some pressing private business, is very emphatic in his assertion that there will be no extra session of congress, while the more thoughtful, unselfish members of congress are just as positive the other way. Looking at the question from all sides, however, it seems hardly possible for the president to avoid calling an extraordinary session of the 57th. Congress in view of the

fact, that such important matters as the Nicaraguan canal bill, the Cuban constitution, legislation for the Philippines and possibly the ship subsidy bill should all have early action. As there remains scarcely three weeks more of this session and many of the most important appropriation bills are still to be considered and passed, it is evident that every moment of this time will be required to accomplish the regular, routine business. If the Cubans draft their constitution by the last of this month and forward it to the president for action by congress, it is hardly probable that he will allow such an important matter to go unheeded all summer. Hence it seems safe to predict an extra session.

### SIDNEY A. FOSTER A CANDIDATE.

He has the ability and would fill the office of governor with dignity and credit to the state.

The counting of the electoral vote for president and vice president at the recent election, took place on Wednesday in the House of Representatives, there being a joint session of the house and senate. Great crowds thronged the galleries and the scene was an imposing one.

### PLENTY OF OPPORTUNITY.

The young man's chance in this country today is better than ever before in the history of the world. There are in fact, more good opportunities now than there are young men fit to seize them, though fit young men are not scarce. There is absolutely no excuse for the pessimists who declare that the young man is, by the new commercial conditions, denied a place in the world's work and absolutely no excuse for the young man who fears to enter upon the struggle.—Chicago Inter Ocean.

Certainly. It is helpful to the young men to say that they have a chance, and it is not harmful to them to keep it in their minds that opportunities will not wait for them, and cannot be depended upon to pile themselves up as a sort of ladder or boost for them. One thing is to be reckoned with, of course, which is that competition for the best chance is to be met with. Young men must bring with them some kind of a schooling, some kind of equipment, if they are to be recognized by or are able themselves to recognize opportunity. They must be able to do things, and they must be able to take an interest in their work.

Competition in business and in the professions is sharp everywhere. That necessitates having men who have heads on them, who can manage, who can bear responsibility, who can be depended upon. It may be admitted that a chance for no-good men is falling off. There is the best reason for it. The world is getting better, the world is getting more particular, and is demanding that men measure up somewhere if they are to be wanted at all. The evolution is important, and is not properly a cause for complaint. The demand is plentiful enough for workers who are equipped for work. Young men who just slide into a job are not to be surprised if they slide out of it. Reputation was never so important, and there never was so little time to experiment with established failures. The world is in such a hurry that there is little time to bother with people who will not take the trouble to bother with themselves. The conditions seem to some to be hard, but they are necessary and must be met.—Sioux City Journal.
