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## EDITORIAL DEPARTMENT.

### DENISON'S OPPORTUNITY.

A glorious opportunity has come to Denison to obtain a splendid public library, one which will be of infinite benefit to the community and one which will be the pride of all our citizens. For many years, through the benefaction of Mrs. McKim, Denison has had a reading room in every way sufficient for the needs of our city. The only thing which has prevented the McKim Hall from being more of a factor in our community has been the well known lack of recent and interesting books. The intellectual palate has become satiated with the works of Cooper and Scott, very good books, but our reading public has perused them and wishes something more. The Friday Club recognized this need and was the means of adding \$150 worth of new and interesting biographies to the library. Through the agency of Prof. H. H. Savage, Denison has now offered to it the sum of \$1000 for the purchase of books, provided \$2500 additional is subscribed by our citizens. It would be a shame and a disgrace to this community to let this offer pass. It would be for us to confess that we have less interest in our own city and in the welfare of its youth than has the generous hearted man who makes the offer. \$3500 well expended will add not less than 2000 books to the library; it will encourage habits of reading and will make the McKim Hall the most popular place in town. We know enough of Denison to feel assured that there will be no hesitancy in raising the additional \$2500 necessary to secure the gift. There are, at least ten men in our city who could amply afford to make up the amount, but this should not be asked, it should be a pleasure to contribute something, it should be joined in by rich and poor alike. Every citizen will be proud of the fact that he has a personal share in the library, and will feel more of a personal interest in it.

The subscription should be started at once and the interest in the work should not flag for a moment until the entire amount is subscribed. Mark Twain tells of the danger of not acting in such matters while the interest is at its height. He tells that he once heard a missionary preach so earnestly that he felt sorry that he only had \$400 in his pocket and looked around to see where he could borrow more. The service dragged along for a while and he concluded that \$100 was enough to give. Then there was still a longer delay until he got sleepy and tired and when finally the contribution was taken up he stole ten cents from the plate. "Delays in such cases," says the humorist, "provoke men to crime." Let us have no delay in this matter.

### THE ASSESSMENTS.

As usual there has been some complaint with the action of the city council in regard to the equalization of assessments. No man or set of men is infallible but we believe the interests of the taxpayers could not be in better or more conservative hands. There will always be injustice in the matter of taxation so long as the present system prevails. The man who has his money invested where it is in plain view of the assessor will always pay more in proportion than the man who has his property hidden in monies and credits concerning which it is difficult for an assessor to obtain an exact information. The council has many difficult tasks but perhaps the most difficult of all is the adjustment of the property valuation. For this reason, even though some of the assessments may appear high to the persons interested, we are inclined to give the council the benefit of the doubt, for we are sure they have acted, not from personal spite or the wish to do anyone an injury, but from the best information they could obtain.

### DEMOCRATIC SENATORIAL SITUATION

It becomes more and more apparent that the democrats of this district are inclined to concede the nomination for state senator to Crawford county. The question is therefore before the democrats of the county as to whom they shall select as their candidate. So far we have heard but two names mentioned in this connection, although it is understood that there are still others who would appreciate the honor. Those who have been men-

tioned for the nomination are Hon. Chas. Bullock and Hon. J. B. Romans. It is said by some that Mr. Romans could have the nomination for the asking and that he would accept but for the fact that he is under an implied promise Mr. Bullock not to stand in his way. Either would make strong candidates from the democratic standpoint. Both men are wealthy and are thus in position to champion the rights of the poor. Mr. Bullock has the longer record as a simon pure democrat but what Mr. Romans lacks in this direction he has made up for in enthusiasm during the short time that he has been a member of that party. The Review has little interest in the affair other than to tell the news. It would not support either of them for such an office and still it thinks that they are perhaps as representative democrats as could be found and has nothing to say against their ambitions.

### BRYAN VS CLEVELAND.

Mr. Bryan and Mr. Cleveland have recently been indulging in a little joint debate as to democracy. The Review has never been an admirer of either of these men. When some republicans were inclined to eulogize Mr. Cleveland because he had sense enough not to follow off after free silver the Review could not forget the many acts of blind stupidity and low bestiality of which he had been guilty. Nevertheless in the recent controversy Cleveland shows a gentleman and a scholar beside the recent leader of the democratic hosts. The letter written by Mr. Cleveland was dignified and earnest. It showed that he had given attention to the questions of the day and had a real regard for what he considered the best interests of the democratic party. Mr. Bryan's answer was what might have been expected of a school boy in the smart and "sassy" age. He offered a reward of \$5 if Mr. Cleveland would give a definition of a democrat. Such child's-play, such attempt at cheap humor was unworthy of a man who has twice been a candidate for the presidency of the United States and but emphasizes the fact that this country was very fortunate in escaping the infiction of having Mr. Bryan occupy the president's chair.

The usual paragraphs are going the rounds about the congressional seed distribution. As it was in the parable of the sower not all the seed will be sown on good ground, not all will go to persons who actually need it, but it is a fact that if one new and valuable species of vegetable were introduced each year throughout the country it would pay the entire expense of the agricultural department. Why is it that the farmers allow so much sport made of the only department of the government intended directly to benefit them. Of course a farmer can close his eyes and refuse to be benefited by any of the experiments which the department may make and he can then truthfully say the department has been of no benefit to him but this is the fault of the farmer and not of the department.

BAILEY, of the Britt Tribune is one of the most original propositions in Iowa Journalism. He has a way of saying more things about a man without making him mad than any other man on the Iowa press. This is the way he tells about one of his friends being in town:

"Oom George Boyle was over from Whittemore Tuesday. Oom George is dealing in lands, politics, banks, religion, social functions, chattel mortgages, science, astronomy, cayuses, city property, geology, literature loans, matrimonial bureaus, art, telephone lines, law, meteorology, live stock and taxidermy. He is quite active for an old man, a genuine ladies man, ambitious, handsome and suave, but he makes his own politics and keeps the whole community dodging his broadsides. He is equally at home in a livery stable or a class meeting and a handy all-round man to have at weddings and dog fights. He borders somewhat on em-bon-point and has a heart in him as big as a four-quart basin and no man in Kossuth county will be missed more than Oom George when he shuffles off this mortal coil if he ever does. He is also an optimist, a cynic, a philanthropist and an old cuss in politics."
