FOR THIS YEAR'S INSTITUTE.

Corps of Instructors Selected and Date Announced.

Supt. A. G. Myers wishes to announce that the Crawford County Teachers Institute will begin on Monday, April 23rd, and continue two weeks. The corps of instructors will be as follows: Conductor, W. C. Van Ness; instructors, N. Spencer, Algona, Supt. Styles, Onawa, Supt. H. H. Savage, Denison, Prof. E. L. Hoffman, West Side, and Miss Ida B. Craft, Denison. The course of study will be the same as last year and teachers will be able to give special advance study thus preparing themselves for the work of the institute. Teachers are especially recommended to attend the six weeks summer school at the Denison College immediately preceding the institute. Teachers are scarce, wages are higher than ever before and the teachers can well afford to equip themselves to get the best schools and the highest wages.
