DES MOINES, IA., April 25.—Gov. Shaw, Lang Bros., H. C. Harris and T. M. Walker, of Des Moines, owners of 3,400 acres of land twelve miles east of Beaumont, Texas, sold half of their property to an eastern syndicate today for \$250,000. Gov. Shaw owned half the property and gets \$125,000 of the money. He paid \$30,000 for his half interest in the rice farm two years ago. —Sioux City Journal.

#### Conger Has Returned.

Minister E. H. Conger has landed in San Francisco. He is well and hale and has recovered from the fearful strain of the awful weeks of the Pekin siege. Upon his arrival Mr. Conger was besieged by many reporters who were anxious to learn if he would be a candidate for Governor. It is unfortunate that he was not allowed to more than set foot upon land before he was called upon to decide this important question. Wisely he deferred any decisive answer until he should get back to Iowa and view the field for himself. The question of the governorship should not enter into the hearty welcome which Iowa owes a man who has proven himself in time of trial to be one of the noblest of her sons. All Iowa should do honor to his greatness, his courage and his wisdom. Factional strife should be laid aside. If Mr. Conger is to be a candidate it will be because the good sense of Iowa republicans indicates that it is time that factional struggles cease and that all unite for the good of the republican party and of the state of Iowa. A man who was big enough to represent America during the Chinese troubles is certainly big enough to represent all factions and all shades of Iowa republicanism and of Iowa people. It may not be that the spirit of compromise and harmony will prevail but there is a strong feeling among many that this is the wisest course.

Prof. W. S. Ginn arrived this week from Salem, Oregon, and will make Denison his home for the coming year. Prof. Ginn is a member of the faculty of the Salem College of Music and Oratory, and is one of the leading musical instructors of the West. He proposes to take pupils here in music and voice culture and to do musical convention work. He still retains his position in the faculty of the Salem college, and those taking the course of instruction under him will receive diplomas from the college the same as if they were in actual attendance there. Mrs. Ginn is a daughter of Mrs. W. T. Huckstep, and it is on account of her mother's health that they will make their home here for this year, at least.
