ALMOST A FIRE.

Fire Discovered in W. A. McHenry's House Sunday Night Prompt Action Saves House

Upon investigation he found the room filled with smoke and intense heat. At the head of this stairway there is a wash room in which is located a wash stand and near by is a gas jet used for the purpose of heating water. During the visit of the Ames students to Denison Mr. McHenry entertained a number of them at his home and this light had been lighted to heat water for bathing purposes. After being used the room was closed up and the gas burned all of Saturday night and Sunday until about dusk when it was discovered. Directly over this gas jet is a large piece of tin and this became so hot in all this time that the wood had been charred through. A small hose was immediately attached to the house hydrant and the smouldering fire extinguished. Mr. McHenry was very fortunate in his discovery; if the fire had burned much longer a blaze would have been started and would have undoubtedly been beyond control within a few minutes.
