On the sixth Gus went to Perry and began making arrangements for the wedding, secured the preacher and all the guests were invited. He then took the train for Adel to procure, as he said the license. This was on the day the wedding was to have taken place. At the appointed hour the minister arrived, the bride was attired in a beautiful wedding gown, the guests were in waiting, but the groom had not returned with the license. The wedding party waited until a local train came in, giving Wiese the benefit of the doubt, that of missing the first train, but he did not come, and to this day has not showed up.
