Letter From Allan Rae, HONG KONG, CHINA, May 14, '01. DEAR FATHER:—We arrived here yesterday morning after a three day trip from Cavite with the usual amount of rolling. Having left there on Saturday afternoon at 3 o'clock p. m. During the first two days we had very pleasant weather but the last one was somewhat rough.

The weather here is much more comfortable than what we have experienced for a long time and we appreciate that fact very much. It is much cooler here than what I had anticipated for I did not expect to find such a change of climate in so short a distance. I can not give any description of Hong Kong as I have not been ashore yet and we are laying across the river from the city on the China side. Hong Kong you know is on an island but lays close to the China coast and the river separating them is perhaps less than three miles wide.

The country around here seems to be some what mountainous and is quite rough with very few trees in sight but it is not at all barren as many mountainous places are. One of the most interesting things I have seen here are the Chinese junks they are a peculiar looking craft different from anything we have seen before being low forward and high aft with sails which much resembles bats wings. Hoping you are all well at home I will close. Yours affectionately,
