# DENISON DEFEATED

All-Americans Beat the Denison Team.

Was a Splendid Game From Start to Finish. Score Was 4 to 3.

Denison bit the dust on Wednesday in a game with the "All-Americans" played at Vail. The game was almost equal to professional playing, and had it not been for costly errors in the field the Denison boys would have won. Hester pitched an almost perfect game and Scharnweber occupied his position as catcher equally as well. The Denison team played well. They made but few errors but nearly every one of them was costly. Wilson missed an easy grounder off third base, Broadus muffed a tip-up fly at short-stop, Kelly fumbled once at second and Rudd got in front of one of Branaka's flies, resulting in a muff which let in two runs. Every player had many good plays to his credit, but the above errors cost the team the game. The team presented by Vail was composed of the following players: Lang, Hamil and "Texas" Walton, of Carroll; Morrison, of the Des Moines league team; DePew, of Rockwell City; Schaffer and Middleton, of Missouri Valley; Milliman, of Logan; and Buckley of Vail.

Denison began the game by scoring two runs which were made principally off of a fine two-bagger by Scharnweber. The "All-Americans" scored in the second inning and then came a long succession of white washes. Several times the bases were full, but the fine work of the pitchers prevented runs and it looked as if the game would so end without another score. At the beginning of the ninth inning, the Denison rooters were getting already for their yell of triumph when a change came. The Vail shouters began all along the line as if by preconcerted action to rattle our players. One of the Vail players sprang up and done the line like an animated jumping jack and the Denison team got rattled, just as the Vail men desired. Hester pitched a steady game, but there was a wrangle and a jangle and a kick at the umpire, a fly went out in the field and between Rudd and Branaka it was missed, letting in two runs. Another run followed and Vail had won. Denison made a grand rally in the last half of the ninth. At this stage of the game, the umpire made a couple of questionable decisions and while Denison scored once, it could not regain its lead.

The Vail boys were happy, they had gone to great expense to hire a team for the occasion and they shouted vigorously. Some of the Denison boys were inclined to be sore, but it is nonsense to get sore about a ball game. Vail had as much right to hire players as Denison has. Denison has engaged men for the season. The fact that seven out of the nine players are "home grown" does not make it any the worse for Vail to hire all nine players if it wished. As to the umpire, Mr. Dugan of Dunlap, we believe he meant to be fair all through. Perhaps he got rattled, just as some of the Denison boys did in the ninth inning, but we believe his intentions were all right. Our team must learn to take its medicine, select the most competent umpire possible and then stop kicking on the decisions. It was amusing to see some of the business men to so far forget themselves as to make accusations of cheating and that the game was stolen. The Vail boys forgot their dignity and did not fail to exult exceeding over their opponents. Base ball is becoming too strenuous, it is good fun, but it should end as fun and without hard feeling.
