

LIBRARY VOTED

Light Vote but Good Majority.

Second Ward Goes Against the Proposition by a Vote of Two to One.

The special election held yesterday resulted in favor of the establishment of the city library. Only about one-fifth of the voters remembered that the election was on and did their duty as citizens. The other four-fifths stayed at home and some of them will perhaps have a good deal of criticism to offer now that it is too late. We are exceedingly glad that the proposition has carried. It will mean much for the intellectual advancement of our people and will make Denison a still more desirable place for those wishing to educate their children. With our splendid school system, our college and a fine large city library, Denison will be one of the best equipped towns in Iowa and will offer an attractive home for many farmers who wish to retire from the hard work of the farm and to live where their children may receive the best advantages.

Under the authorization of the special election the mayor now has the appointment of nine library commissioners, three of whom will retire each year. These appointments must be approved by the council.

The commissioners have entire charge of the city library and can levy a tax not to exceed two mills each year.
