

# FOULLY MURDERED

## J. H. Love's Head is Crushed.

### Body Found Near Arion Friday Morning--Inquest Throws no Light on the Tragedy.

Trainmen on the Milwaukee railway found the mangled remains of a man lying near the track one-half mile west of Arion on Friday morning. The city officials were at once notified and further examination revealed a great pool of blood near the right-of-way fence and behind a pile of snow fence, also blood spattered all over the boards of the snow fence, on the wires of the right-of-way fence and on the ground round about. Not a dozen feet away lay a coupling pin which was all covered with blood and towards the track were several pools of blood showing where the body had been dragged to the track with the evident intent of having a passing train obliterate the signs of crime. The mangled man's skull was crushed by repeated blows with the heavy instrument, the doctors found no less than three compound fractures and several other contusions almost any one of which would have been sufficient to cause death. The back of the head was split open like an egg shell and the body presented a most gruesome sight. Justice Stilson took immediate steps to notify the proper officials and on Friday forenoon the coroner, county attorney and sheriff were on the spot, and a coroner's jury consisting of Messrs. Maurer, Michaelson and Evans was empanelled.

By cards and a note book found on the body the man was identified as being one J. H. Love. Later it was found that he was known to Mr. and Mrs. T. R. Clements of South Omaha,

story has corroborative testimony. The coroner's inquest developed almost nothing beyond the facts as above stated and the murder is as much a mystery today as it was on Friday morning. The people of Arion are greatly disappointed as the community is anxious that the guilty parties be punished.

We have no criticism to make of the officers as we believe they did everything possible to obtain a clue. As usual in such cases there were hundreds of rumors but when traced down they were found either to amount to little or to have no connection with the case. The ending of the inquest does not mean that the officers have relaxed their vigilance and they are determined to sift the matter to the bottom. The coroner's jury brought in the verdict customary in such cases, that deceased came to his death by blows by a blunt instrument in the hands of a party or parties unknown. The tragedy was a fearful one and columns could be filled with the lurid details of the crime and the miscellaneous testimony given regarding Love and his stay in Arion. The above are all the essential facts, however, and in the interests of justice it is not best that all that the officers may know should be published until there are further developments.

A. R. Clark of East Dubuque and that he had relatives living in Trenton, Mo. He had been about Arion for two days, eating at restaurants but sleeping with a party of hoboes in the open air. It was thought that he was a professional gambler from the fact that he spent a portion of his time in marking a deck of cards, that he invited C. A. Galland to play poker with him, which invitation was refused, and that he told one of his companions at the hobo camp that he was going to Dakota to get up crap game. Over fifty dollars was found on his body, some loose change in his pocket and the remainder in a purse sewed inside his shirt. It was found later that he had more than a hundred dollars when leaving Omaha a few days before, and at Arion he showed quite a roll of loose bills, so the theory of robbery is still held. He was last seen by C. A. Galland about 6 o'clock on Wednesday evening and was going in the direction of the scene of the murder. He was fairly well-dressed, but had on overalls and appeared more like a man who is posing as a laboring man than a real toiler. His hands were small, shapely and uncalloused and he showed no signs of hard work. He was a tall, well-built man, with sandy hair and moustache.

Suspicion was at once drawn to several parties, a tramp who had been seen with him the day before was arrested at Mapleton on Friday, but he was able to prove an alibi and was released. Two darkies were with the murdered man on the evening of the tragedy and were seen in the vicinity. The officers have been unable to find a trace of them. The negroes are described as being, one tall and fairly slender, height about five feet ten inches; the other shorter and heavier set, with a large, black, soft hat. Both men were clean shaved and about 30 years of age apparently. These men are wanted badly as the most direct suspicion points to them as the perpetrators. Suspicion was also directed against two Arion youths who were seen on the evening of the tragedy with blood on their clothes. They were able to prove an alibi and stated that the blood came from a fight among themselves while on their way to attend the picnic at Vall on Wednesday afternoon.
