## CAREY IS NAMED

### Democratic Senatorial Nomination.

#### Fifty-one Ballots are Taken. Crawford Not Solid for the Nominee.

Mr. John T. Carey, of Denison, was nominated for senator by the democrats of this district on the fifty-first ballot yesterday. The convention took place at Missouri Valley and was presided over by

Mr. J. B. Romans. Mr. Romans desired the nomination for himself but was side-tracked by factional disputes as already recorded in the Review. There were four candidates in the field, Patterson of Harrison, Chrisman of Monona, and Carey and Davie of Crawford. At no time did Mr. Carey receive the solid support of his home county. It was claimed by some of the delegates that Mr. Carey had declared that he was not a candidate for senator but for representative and that on the strength of this statement Mr. Davie had announced his candidacy. For this reason a number of the delegates refused to vote for Carey at any stage of the game. John T. Carey is one of the old settlers

of this county although comparatively a young man. He has been prominent in county politics and has many friends. He has held public office continuously for the past twelve years and has been a reliable and trustworthy official. There is some feeling among democrats, however that John is showing a tendency to take all the honors and salaries to himself and that it would have come with good grace from him to allow some other democrat a show. While possessing many qualifications for a good business man and a good county officer in a clerical position, Mr. Carey is lacking in those elements which go to the making of a good legislator. He is not a speaker, having neither the voice nor the experience necessary. He is a good man in his place but his place is not in legislative halls where it is expected that a senator shall be ready and able not only to cast his own vote but to influence the votes of others. We wish to say now at the opening of the campaign that we have no word to say against Mr. Carey as a man or a citizen. He is honest, truthful and a personal friend of the editor of the Review. No heat of party strife shall tempt us to say ought against his personality but we do believe that this senatorial district requires a man of more experience in legislative lines and we shall say so. Were Mr. Carey running for other than a strictly political office he would doubtless receive many complimentary republican votes, as it is he cannot expect the republicans to desert their legislative ticket out of personal friendship.

A bold hold-up took place in Denison last week when two railroaders attacked one of their fellows in the alley back of Mr. William Raine's residence, threw him to the ground and forcibly robbed him of some fifteen dollars. The affair was seen by a number of witnesses. The case was reported at once and the men were soon arrested. The men were arraigned before Mayor Wilson but waived examination and were committed to the county jail to await the action of the grand jury.

## McKINLEY MEMORIAL MEETING

### At the Opera House in Denison at Two O'clock Thursday Afternoon. Program Arranged. All Business Houses Will Close.

IN PURSUANT with the proclamation issued by Theodore Roosevelt, President of the United States, with the proclamation issued by Leslie M. Shaw, Governor of Iowa, and the proclamation issued by A. D. Wilson Mayor of our city, the business houses of Denison will close on the afternoon of Thursday, September 19, and one and all are requested to unite in the Citizen's McKinley Memorial Meeting to be held at the opera house at two o'clock in the afternoon. A program has been hastily arranged and a number have been asked to participate. It is hoped that no one will fail to show his respect and esteem for the memory of our martyred President. The schools of the city will be closed and business of all kinds will be suspended. The unanimity with which the business men have agreed to this is most pleasing. We believe that no man will lose in the respect of his neighbors by showing the greatest possible respect to the President's memory. It is also requested that as many as possible of the business houses and residences of the city be draped in mourning and that on Thursday our people refrain from their usual pursuits and join in the observance of this day of general grief throughout our country. The farmers of this vicinity are also invited to join with the citizens of Denison in the Memorial service.

### GOT THE WORST OF IT.

#### Fist Fight Results Badly for "Carty" and Also for His Opponent.

P. M. McCarthy was badly worsted in a fight last week by Charley Robbinault. The encounter took place in front of Healey Bros. livery barn and "Carty's" face was bleeding from every pore when the scrap was over. Robbinault was arrested and brought before Justice Gulick. He claimed that Carthy was drunk and used vile epithets toward him and that he had done this on several occasions, he also claimed that he did not strike with his clenched fist but that he pushed Carthy and he being in an intoxicated condition fell from the walk and struck against a wagon and some scrap iron and thus received the injuries. ## SENATORIAL SITUATION

### Republican Convention Fails to Nominate.

#### Adjourns to Meet at Onawa Next Monday. Kuehnle's Chances Good.

The Republican senatorial convention met at Logan last Tuesday. Each county presented a candidate and each county stayed by the man of its choice during the 115 ballots which were taken. The manner in which the delegates clung to their choice was highly complimentary to the candidates voted for. It is hoped, however, that a nomination may be made at the next convention. It would seem that the logical thing for the republicans of the district to do is to nominate the Crawford county candidate as the democrats have already nominated a Crawford county man. Mr. Kuehnle is a strong second choice with a large majority of the delegates. They recognize in him a man eminently qualified for the position and a man who can win if any one can. We have no word of disrespect for either of the other candidates or for the loyalty displayed towards them by their delegates, but we do believe that the nomination of Mr. Kuehnle would be the best one not only from a party standpoint but in the interests of the people as a whole. Crawford county is prepared to stand by Mr. Kuehnle until the balloting is finished. In spite of the close contest and the protracted session of the convention, we have never seen a more good natured crowd and it is a foregone conclusion that the republicans of the district will loyally support whoever may be nominated. The convention adjourned to meet at Onawa next Monday.
