HON. HUGH LANGAN

Republican Candidate for Representative. Sketch of Life and Character. A Good Man to Vote For.

The subject of our sketch was born in the North of Ireland, within the boundaries of the county where once lived the ancestors of our late lamented, martyred President, William McKinley. When a child, his parents emigrated to America, as many of the once well to do Irish families were forced to do. Owing to adverse circumstances, existing in their native land, they were forced to seek a home in this land of freedom and liberty, and here to the United States they came in thousands and hundreds of thousands, from all other nations as well, to carve out their fortunes and build up happy homes in this, the only country on earth where a welcome was extended to the people of the old world.

Mr. Langan's parents settled in Pennsylvania and there surrounded by the influence of the good and law abiding citizens, the followers of the moral and peaceable teachings of William Penn, our Mr. Langan built the foundation of the since acquired, liberal education which he possesses.

Some years after the Langans settled in the good Quaker state, our own Iowa was extending to emigrants a cordial welcome to settle upon and cultivate her virgin soil, which by the way, is the best soil on earth. At that time the watchword of Horace Greeley and others was "Young man go west," and Mr. Langan's father, having been a farmer in his native land, quickly and wisely decided to come west in order that his family consisting of seven,

so well pleased with his legislative services, that they decided that he possessed the ability and qualities to make a good congressman and a short time afterward, he was persuaded to go into the state convention as a candidate for the nomination for congressman for the state at large, but at the state convention Mr. Langan with one or two others were beaten by the ablest man in the state, who received said nomination in nearly the same manner as Mr. Langan received the nomination here in our convention, while it was not done by acclamation it was on the first ballot taken.

Since that convention, Mr. Langan has dropped out of politics, having so much of his own personal business to manage it had occupied his entire time, and as he expresses it, he would not accept the nomination for this or any other office in the gift of the people of the state at this time, except by the persuasion of friends in Crawford county, whom he has known a quarter of a century. While he was out of the state, some six or eight years, Crawford county seemed always home to him. Even while at Sioux City a couple of years or more after his return from South Dakota, it did not seem like home to him and in fact he spent nine-tenths of his time on his farm here in Crawford county and for the past year and more he has made his home at West Side having given up his office business at Sioux City.

children, four sons and three daughters, might have a better opportunity to make homes and carve out their own fortunes in the then considered far west. He consequently moved his family to this state and settled in Clinton county, near DeWitt, where they were happy and prosperous during his lifetime. After the father's death, the remaining unmarried members of the family, Hugh and James with their widowed mother, decided to come further west and settled in the eastern part of this, Crawford county, where they are held in the highest esteem by all who know them.

The energetic spirit of our candidate was not quite satisfied with his number of broad acres of Crawford county soil, and after the death of his mother, with whom he had lived all these years, he decided to go a little farther West for a time and settled at Centerville, S. D., where he made his home for a few years. Shortly after taking up his residence in South Dakota, he was honored by a nomination similar to that received at our last convention. At that time the two parties were about equal in numbers and the republican party made search for the man they considered the strongest in the district, which embraced three of the oldest counties in the state and included the city of Yankton, the capital of the state. Mr. Langan's opponent had the advantage of being an old and favorably known settler, yet when the vote was counted Mr. Langan was seventeen hundred votes ahead. He made a creditable record as a legislator and few of the members were more prominent than Mr. Langan on the floor of the legislative hall and in committee work.
