MR. CAREY AND MR. BRYAN.

While Mr. Davie goes about the county telling the people that this campaign is upon state issues only, while Mr. Phillips (whom we would explain, is the democratic candidate for governor this year, is repudiating Bryan and all his works, Mr. Carey has seen a new light. Mr. Carey has always posed as a man who is slightly better than his party. He accepted free silver as a radical and rather impossible doctrine of his party, which he hoped it would get over without serious effects, but in all the years when free silver was an issue he voted for it with the mental reservation that he hoped it would not prevail, but that as a democratic office-holder he could do no less than vote the democratic ticket. This position has been well understood by his Denison friends for a number of years past. This fall Mr. Carey received the nomination for senator and the whole force of the democracy has been directed towards his election. Everything else is being sacrificed to that end, from governor down to corner. Mr. Phillips was billed to speak here, but he was called off as it was thought that he was not strong enough in the silver faith and that the poor impression which it was feared he would make, might injure the ticket and thus hurt Carey's chances. It happens that while a large number of the democrats of this county have practically abandoned free silver, the leaders of the party in the district, such as Messrs. Romans and Gary of this county, are still strong advocates of that doctrine, and for this reason Mr. Carey has been forced to leave his old position and to throw his weight with the silver forces. It was with his consent, and very probably with his money, that Mr. Romans made his recent trip to Lincoln and hired the patriot of the Platte to speak at Onawa in Mr. Hogue's own county for an hour or two in the forenoon.

In this relation we wish to call the attention of the voters to two things: First, the calling of Bryan into this district over the protest of the democratic candidate for Governor, means that Mr. Carey has surrendered body and soul to the silver element of his party, that if elected he will do their bidding and that in calling Bryan to his assistance he has accepted Bryan as an article of his democratic faith. Second, that while Mr. Carey is making urgent personal appeal to republicans of this county to give him a "complimentary vote" he is spending his money and doing everything in his power to prevent the democrats of Monona county from doing that which he requests the republicans of Crawford to do. Carey is trying to play a game of heads I win and tails you lose with the republicans of this county. He has surrendered to the silver element and has secured the working support of every silverite in the district with this understanding, and he is making the fight of his life to prevent the democrats of Monona from contracting the "complimentary vote" habit which he is trying to inoculate among the republicans of Crawford and especially of Denison. John Carey as a man and a citizen is all right, John Carey as the apostle of free silver and the especial representative of Bryan in the Iowa Senate, is all wrong.

JUD'S BUSY SEASON.

This is the busy season for the Hon. Jud Gary. He is out about the county six, nay, possibly seven, days out of the week, instructing the democrats of the county as to their duty. In fact it is reported to us that Jud is making a saloon to saloon canvass of the county and that the democratic campaign committee feels that its six to ten dollars per day is being well spent. Occasionally Jud drops into Denison for a half day to edit the Bulletin and to give Romans a few pointers. The combination is a good one, Gary furnishes the brains and eloquence, Romans the cash and Caswell the blank paper upon which the burning thoughts of Mr. Gary are presented to the people. We are glad that there are some simon pure democrats of the Gary stripe left in the county to impress upon the people the importance of voting for free silver this fall. Were it not for such as Mr. Gary the people might become satisfied with present conditions, forget their woes, look with confidence and hope to the future and vote with the party of William McKinley. During the past week Mr. Gary has been spending his time in the east end of the county explaining to the Irish-Americans that they should be satisfied as they have Mr. Carey on the ticket. He says that it has been a practice of democracy for many years to have Mr. Carey represent the Irish element on their ticket and that Mr. Carey himself thought that it would be best not to have any other Irishman on the ticket this year. As an apostle of democracy Jud is a great and leading light. Our democratic brethren should rejoice in him and give thanks that he has deigned to condescend to the management of their party in the county.

TRAY IN BAD COMPANY.

When Mr. Carey goes about Denison asking the votes of republicans, he should read to them the story of the little dog Tray, who was caught in bad company. We do not mean that Mr. Carey is in bad company because he is running on a democratic ticket, but he is in bad company from the fact that though he has always been counted a stalwart old-time democrat he has surrendered without conditions to the silver-republican element, has by his actions avowed himself an apostle of Mr. Bryan and free silver. Mr. Carey will, if elected, be obliged to give his support to the silver wing of democracy, for he has eaten of their bread and accepted favors at their hands and has placed the management of his campaign in their charge. If you are not in favor of Bryan and free silver, and anti-republicanism and anti-expansion and anti-Dolliverism and anti-Allisonism, do not vote for Mr. Carey. Tell him there is a difference between running for city treasurer and running for state senator, that your party represents principles in which you believe, that you have a splendid man on your own ticket and that you are going to vote for the republican candidate this fall.

BRIBERY CHARGES.

As we expected the Bulletin has at last reached the stage of the campaign where it talks of republican slush money and begs its fellow democrats to be honest and not to sell their votes. These charges which the Bulletin repeats in every campaign, without any ground for so doing, are insulting alike to republicans and democrats. We resent them not on account of the republicans alone but in behalf of the voters of this county no matter to what party they may belong. We do not believe there is a spot on earth that is freer from debasing election methods. We know of no democratic votes that are for sale and we know of no one who would buy them if they were. For our part we have as much faith in the honest and honorable characters of those who are assisting in the conduct of the republican campaign as we have in the gentlemen who are assisting in conducting the democratic fight. These wholesale insinuations of bribery are serious matters. They reflect on the reputation of good and honorable men and in fact on the reputation of the whole community. If the Bulletin has any proof that any democrat has accepted a bribe or that any republican has offered one it is its duty to present the facts to the grand jury and to the people. The Bulletin's attack upon the voters of the county is exactly in line with the famous "Sawbuck" circular issued by Chairman Cook last year. Let us conduct a decent and honorable campaign. Do not let us befool our own nest by accusing the members of our party of being bribe takers or the members of the opposition of being bribe givers. If now or at any other time the Bulletin has any facts to present it is its duty to state them plainly; if not, it is its duty to apologize to the democrats and republicans of the county alike, for its dirty and unfounded insinuations of bribery.

POLITICAL PARAGRAPHS.

The Bulletin calmly asks the democratic voters if they are going to accept republican money to stay away from the polls this year. It is a dirty bird that befools its own nest.

The Bulletin says it is in politics just now. It is in politics to the extent of printing official ballots at an exorbitant price, that is all.

George Myers was an ardent advocate of the two term rule before he was elected and he doubtless will be again after election.

Chairman Spence is conservative when he places Cummins' majority at from 80,000 to 100,000.

The best monument Iowa can erect to William McKinley is to heap up a colossal republican majority this fall.

Do not repudiate the record of the Martyred President by voting against his policies.

Crawford county republicans want to do their share toward the election of Allison and Dolliver and they cannot be led astray by the "complimentary vote" proposition.
