POLICE COURT KEPT BUSY

OFFENDERS BIG AND LITTLE
BROUGHT BEFORE THE COURT

Serious Charge Against Arthur Lenz Who is Held to Grand Jury. Youthful Tough Shoots at North-Western Brakeman.

This has been a busy week for acting Mayor Wm. McLennan. Numerous cases of more or less degree of wickedness have been brought before him.

On Monday Arthur Lenz, a young man of about twenty, was arrested charged with criminal assault upon the eleven year old daughter of Geo. Redenbaugh. The testimony as brought forward at the preliminary examination showed that Lenz was working at the opera house and saw the girl going past. It is alleged that he enticed her into the opera house on the pretext that another girl had left a letter for her. In the ticket room he is said to have committed the offense, the girl crying and protesting. About this time Jim Melton came along and Lenz released the girl and told Melton that she was his sister and that he had been scolding her. As soon as released the Redenbaugh girl hastened home and told her mother with the result that an information was filed. What we have stated above are the facts alleged in the case and if they are proven to be true it should go very hard with the young man. It is said that this is not his first offense of a similar nature.

In our last issue we mentioned the case of the three boys, who were arrested for shooting at a North-Western brakeman. Upon the hearing two of the boys were released, but the third boy, a young degenerate, was held to await the action of the grand jury. Leigh Rhodes is the name given by the youngster and he seems to be a genuine tough from Toughville. The shooting occurred at the siding just west of Denison. Train No. 8 stopped there to sidetrack, and as the brakeman, Mike O'Connell, went back to set the switch he drove the boys, who were stealing a ride, from the train. As soon as he got away from the train Rhodes opened fire with a forty-eight calibre revolver shooting four times, the last time when O'Connell was but 4 feet from him and missing him by a hair's breadth. Upon being brought before the court, the young culprit showed no signs of remorse or trepidation. He said he was sorry he didn't hit O'Connell and that he came mighty near it, and that if he was sent to the reform school he would put a bullet in O'Connell for every year he had to stay there. Justice McLennan held Rhodes to await the action of the grand jury and released the boys who were with him. It is probable that Rhodes will be sent to the Eldora reformatory.

A row took place near Klinker's saloon in which the help of the authorities was called. One of the fighters ran for it when he saw the officers coming and took refuge in Mr. King's barn. At the time Mr. King was at work in the barn with an old broom. When the man rushed in Mr. King went after the intruder with the broom and soon the marshal appeared on the scene and took the man up town and he paid the small fine of \$2 and costs for the trouble he had made.

A neighborhood row in broken English and rapid German was aired before Justice McLennan on Thursday. Mrs. Phillip Giss swore out a warrant against Mr. and Mrs. Theodor charging them with throwing stones at her. Marshal Wilson and Deputy Retman made the arrests and brought Mr. and Mrs. Theodor into court. The torrent of words that was let loose when the case was called simply dumb-founded the court, the interpreter and marshal, and McLennan swears he will burn up the information before he will listen to the thing again. If he does have to have another trial, he has threatened to call the editor of the Review as interpreter and to summons a jury of Hamburgers to sit on the case. The case is called for ten o'clock on Saturday morning, and we should advise everybody who is apt to be called on a jury to get out of town. This case is a trivial back-fence quarrel and should never have been brought before any court.
