TIME TO GET TOGETHER.

The struggles of politics are well in their place. They give the zest of strenuousness to American life, intensify mental activity and are as a rule good for the body politic. This is especially true, if after the heat of a campaign, the people have the good sense to drop political animosities and get together for the helpful work of the community. Of necessity this community like others has to a certain extent been divided into hostile camps during the campaign. Men have felt drawn to men of their own party and have to a degree held aloof from those of opposite political faith, not from lack of personal friendship but because their thoughts were occupied along different lines. It is now time to get together. There are many matters in which the whole community is concerned and now is the time to push them. We would suggest that the business men's association have a meeting to discuss the welfare of the community. Something should be done in the library matter. We are not inclined to look a gift horse in the mouth, but it is now a long time since the money for the new books was so generously donated and yet Denison seems no nearer to seeing the accomplishment of the purpose of these philanthropists than it did six months ago.

Last year the street fair project was discussed and was rejected chiefly because it was thought to be too late. Let us have a street fair association, let the merchants pay their contributions in installments and let us have a live committee appointed which shall get in communication with the best possible attractions for next year.

The new hotel project we have always with us. We have heard at least a half dozen of the monied men of the town say they would take a thousand dollars worth of stock in a new hotel, we believe there are several available sites which could be obtained, the present owner taking the greater part, if not all of the purchase price in stock. The Review is not a knocker. We believe in letting every business stand on its own merits and we are satisfied that the present hotel proprietors do the best possible with the equipment at their command. Nevertheless, and without any desire to injure any one, it is an apparent fact that Denison needs a modern and up-to-date fire-proof hotel. We believe it would pay fair dividends not only directly but indirectly as it would add to the good name and to the general business of our city.

Denison needs new store buildings. The reason we do not have them is that good locations are few, that merchants are obliged to pay high rentals for very poor buildings. If a few good store rooms were erected so that tenants could have an opportunity to move if they wished, other property owners would be forced to build or see their tenants go elsewhere. With but few exceptions, the business part of Denison must be entirely rebuilt within the next few years. It is unnecessary for us to go into details, in print, for everyone knows how worn out and utterly delapidated some of the buildings are in which now large businesses are maintained. We are mighty proud of Denison in some ways but every one of us has to blush for it in others. Again it is hard to condemn the individual property owner. It is good business to reason that so long as a building worth five hundred dollars will pay twenty per cent it would be foolish to invest \$5000. that would at best pay not more than ten, or eight or six per cent. The only way that this new building era can be brought about is to force it by creating competition in rents. If a new hotel were erected with several fine store rooms, it would give an outlet for some of these cramped and illy-housed stores, it would reduce the rents of the poorer store building, and force property owners to erect adequate building, if they wished desirable and good paying tenants. The republicans and independent democrats have done enough crowing and our democrats have eaten enough crow and it is time to get together to help build up the city in which we expect to make our homes.
