# GOV. SHAW OF IOWA

# THE LESSONS HE DRAWS FROM NOVEMBER ELECTIONS

# A Further Proof of the People's Faith in the Republican Party—Not the Time to Talk of Candidates for 1894.

"When a political party sacrifices principle to expediency it forfeits the confidence of the people."  
This is the lesson drawn from the November elections by Governor Leslie M. Shaw of Iowa, who has frequently been mentioned as a Republican Presidential possibility. Governor Shaw will lecture tonight in the High school auditorium for the benefit of the Helping Hand institute. He is staying at the Baltimore. Governor Shaw declared that he was not going to lecture. He said: "I am just going to talk."  
His manner is bluff and hearty. Both his handshake and style of expression are vigorous and warrant the conclusion that his "talk" will be spirited and entertaining.  
"The result of the fall elections this year," he went on, "is an unqualified indorsement of the Republican national administration. It is all the more gratifying because it was so emphatic—and unusual in an off year. The off year elections generally reveal any reaction that has been against the party in power. The conditions this year show that the democratic party is all at sea. It made a mistake in setting aside its principles and casting about for expedients to catch votes. There is no longer any confidence in it. On the other hand the elections show that the republican party is stronger than ever. The confidence that a child has in its parents is not stronger than the confidence of the people in the republican party today. If there are no unlooked for developments, to upset the present trend of events the party will be retained in power at the next general election."  
When an attempt was made to open a discussion of the Presidential possibilities in the next campaign Governor Shaw raised his hand in protest and his face became very grave as he said: "STAND BY THE PRESIDENT."  
"Not one word along that line. Our duty at present is to stand by the President and not embarrass his administration with a discussion of such matters. Those who have the welfare of the country and the republican party at heart should help make the present administration a success. It is time enough to take those matters up later. I have great admiration for President Roosevelt, for the manner in which he has conducted himself in the face of grave responsibilities thrust unexpectedly upon him by the death of President McKinley. You cannot quote me too strongly in praise of Mr. Roosevelt. He should be sustained in every possible manner in meeting the task before him and the country has faith in him."  
Reverting to the election in his own state, the governor said it afforded a striking illustration of the disorganized state of the democracy over all the country.  
"The state convention," he said, "adopted a free silver platform; the candidate for governor repudiated it, and between them both they lost the free silver and the gold democrat vote. That's expediency for you."  
An effort will be made to have Governor Shaw of Iowa speak at the Central High school tomorrow morning.
