A number of Denison young ladies engaged the Denison Bowling Co.'s alleys yesterday afternoon for a couple of hours pleasure. The ladies rolled very good scores for beginners and if they continue the game we will in a short time produce some of the best bowlers in the state.

closest bowling contests of the season proved to be a one-sided affair when Chambers' and Wright's Hamburgers met on the Lane and Leiby alleys last Friday night. Much was expected from Wright's team after the fine record they made in the contest game last Wednesday. But Chambers found his opponents "easy marks" and took two out of the three games, winning by a total of 109 pins. No high scores were made by either team. In the last issue of this paper we called attention to the extreme measures used in "rooting." The item seemed to have little or no effect on the bowlers, for instead of calming them down there was more noise in evidence than at any previous game. Some of the bowlers carried it so far as to reach their hand over the alley when the bowler was about to deliver the ball. If an umpire were selected who is thoroughly acquainted with the rules he would immediately stop any interference with the bowlers. The following is part of the rule governing this point: "If any player is interfered with by a spectator or any other bowler, the umpire shall immediately declare such ball 'dead' and allow the player to roll again, after replacing the pins as they were before such ball was rolled." This is a point the captain of each team should insist on being enforced.

The Dubuque Bowling team met defeat at Rockford Ill. last Friday in the third series of contest games bowled between these two cities. Rockford captured two out of the three series of seven games each. Rockford rolled 6023 pins in the seven games while Dubuque rolled 5885. This makes an average of 860 pins per game for Rockford and 841 pins for Dubuque. This is exceptional good bowling and is seldom beaten in any Big Leagues in the same number of games.

During the month of November Chicago big league consisting of eight teams, rolled seventeen games over the 1000 mark. This is a record never approached by the Bowlers of Greater New York who are the only players who can be compared with those of Chicago the other bowling centers being far behind. The Tosettis Chicago's crack team of which mention has been made in this column on several previous occasions won eight out of the seventeen games over the high score.

More interest is growing daily in the great national Bowling Tournament to be held in Buffalo in January. \$2000 has already been guaranteed in prize money by the Buffalo promoters, and 85 percent of the entrance money will also be added to this sum.

We understand that the femon-Boone team will represent Iowa at the national Bowling Tournament to be held in Buffalo in January. The team will go there in a special car granted them for this occasion.
