#### LUCKY IOWA CONGRESSMAN.

Judge Conner From Tenth District Secures Envious Recognition.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 18.—In the assignment of committee places to the members of the Iowa delegation in congress Speaker Henderson recognized the worth of these members by giving them good places on the most important committees of the house. This is perfectly proper, for the Iowa delegation stands second to none in the congress of the United States. Of all the members, however, it seems that Judge Conner, of the Tenth district, has, perhaps, the best reason to be proud of his recognition. Though a new member, this being his first full term, as he was appointed to succeed Senator Dooliver, yet he has developed so much strength that the speaker recognized his eminent fitness for one of the largest committees of the house. He, therefore, selected him among twenty-nine applicants from all over the United States for a position on the great committee of public buildings and grounds, a committee which has perhaps as much to do with matters immediately touching the interests of the people as any other in congress. The contest for a position on this committee was very great, nearly every state asking for it, and supporting their candidates by a strong showing of endorsements from individuals, boards of trade and other business organizations. Mr. Conner's friends in the Tenth district asked this position for him, and the speaker recognizing his ability decided to give it to him. Judge Conner and his many friends in the Tenth district, and also in the state at large, may justly feel proud of the high rank he is taking among the lawmakers of the nation. He is a man who will make a record and whose future prospects are especially bright.—Marshalltown Times-Republican.
