

### CASHIER IS \$35,000 SHORT.

Trusted Employee Speculates With Bank's Funds.  
Taunton, Mass., Jan. 7.—Harry H. Townsend, cashier of the Bristol County National bank, is \$35,000 short in his accounts, the deficit having been found last night by Bank Examiner Ewer. The deficit is said to have been due to speculation in cotton futures. Townsend is under the eye of a United States officer until the bank's affairs are further investigated. When the irregularities were called to Cashier Townsend's attention he admitted that he was short in his accounts to the amount stated. Townsend had worked in the bank since he left school, some 25 years ago. One of the directors said that apparently the defalcation had been going on for two years and that Townsend admitted this.

### BEAVER CITY'S SECOND FIRE.

Seven More Business Buildings Burn, Making Total of Fourteen.  
Beaver City, Neb., Jan. 7.—For the second time in four months the business portion of Beaver City has suffered severely by fire. Yesterday seven buildings on the south side were burned, making a total of 14 business houses in the two fires. The heaviest losers are Ayers & Co., general merchandise, loss \$8,000, insurance \$5,000; Moore & Ellis, hardware and groceries, loss \$3,500, insurance \$2,500; Ness & Orcutt, meat market, loss \$600, insurance \$400.

### BEATRICE WOMAN IS KILLED.

Victim of Chicago Street Car Identified as Mrs. J. L. Ashby.  
Chicago, Jan. 7.—The remains of a woman thrown from a West Madison street cable Sunday were identified as those of Mrs. Joan B. Ashby, formerly of Beatrice, Neb., and heir to a fortune of \$20,000. Her maiden name was Mabel I. Sisson. Her husband is said to be in Chicago, but the police have been unable to locate him. A coroner's jury returned a verdict of accidental death. The remains will be forwarded to Beatrice for burial.

### Appoints Missouri Officers.

Washington, Jan. 7.—President Roosevelt yesterday notified Representative Barthold (Mo.) that he had decided to appoint Ben Westhus internal revenue collector of the eastern district of Missouri to succeed H. C. Grenner, resigned, and Colonel D. P. Deyer, United States district attorney, to succeed Edward Rossier on the expiration of the latter's term. The above appointments are considered victories for the anti-Kerens faction in Missouri.

### Artist Ends Her Life.

New York, Jan. 7.—Miss Hannah H. Coggins, an artist of some note, said to be of wealthy and prominent Philadelphia family connections, was found dead in her studio in this city yesterday. Her death was reported as one of suicide, one end of a rubber tube from an open gas jet being in her mouth. She was not in need of money, for there was more than \$75 in cash in her rooms.

### Banker Attempts Suicide.

Diller, Neb., Jan. 7.—Smith Diller, cashier of the First National bank of this place, and in whose honor the town was named, seriously gashed his throat with suicidal intent yesterday. Although badly injured, he will probably recover. Diller's child died from accidental poisoning a few months ago and since then he has been mentally deranged.

### Two Men Arrested for Crime.

Chicago, Jan. 7.—A body, said to be that of Carrie Larson, and which had a weight around its neck, was taken from the river here yesterday. James Thomas, cook of the steamer Oscar, and Robert Rieseck, who also worked on the boat, were placed under arrest following the discovery.

### Pioneer Lumberman Dead.

LaCrosse, Wis., Jan. 7.—Silas Boardman, one of the oldest lumbermen of this city, died yesterday, aged 67. He was one of the first to engage in the logging business on the Mississippi.

### Methodist Clergyman Assaulted.

Vinton, Ia., Jan. 7.—Rev. F. L. Loveland, a Methodist pastor, was assaulted in his own home yesterday by a burglar, who inflicted a head wound. He will recover.

### SPARKS FROM THE WIRES.

Captain William Stanley died at Austin, Minn., Monday.

The Chicago and Southeastern railroad is again tied up by a general strike of trainmen.

The Western Oil association, comprising oil operators in Colorado, Wyoming, Utah and New Mexico, was organized in Denver Monday.

William Condon, who was shot by Detective George Williams at St. Louis Monday while resisting arrest, is dead. During his life Condon has killed two men.

A case famous in international diplomacy was closed Monday by the payment of \$7,500 damages to Mrs. Lenz, the mother of Frank G. Lenz, the American wheelman who was killed by Turkish officials.

Thomas Hughes, for 14 years city passenger agent of the Missouri Pacific railway in Kansas City, has been made traveling passenger agent of that road in the northwest territory, with headquarters at Omaha.

The open air treatment for persons in early stages of consumption is shown to have been efficacious to the effect of about 67 per cent of the cases treated during the past year at the Massachusetts state sanitarium at Rutland.

### Secures Ten Years in Prison.

Des Moines, Jan. 7.—Elijah Eathcote was yesterday sentenced to a term of ten years in the penitentiary for breaking into his wife's room and shooting her three times because she would not live with him. Her recovery was almost miraculous.

### To Stamp Out Blackmail.

New York, Jan. 7.—Mayor Low sent his message to the board of aldermen yesterday. It was brief and the only subject treated was blackmail in the civil administration, for the stamping out of which he said he desired the co-operation of the city.

### Death of Architect Clark.

Washington, Jan. 7.—Edward Clark, the architect of the capitol, died here yesterday of catarrhal pneumonia. He had been in falling health for several years. Mr. Clark came from Philadelphia and entered upon his duties as capitol architect in 1865. He was 78 years old.

### House Transacts No Business.

Washington, Jan. 7.—The house transacted no business yesterday. Immediately after it met Lodenlager (N. J.) announced the death of Senator Sewell, and after the adoption of the customary resolutions, the house as a further mark of respect adjourned.
