

EAST STREET SHOPS BURNED.

Big Building Containing Many Factories is Destroyed. Springfield, O., Feb. 11.—The great East street shops, built by William N. Whitely, the "Reaper King," at a cost of \$2,000,000, were destroyed by fire yesterday. The shops were occupied by the Springfield Foundry company, Progress Stove company, Indianapolis Frog and Switch company, Kyle Art Glass company, Krell-French Piano company, Miller Gas Engine company, Champion Chemical company and Owens Machine Tool company. The building was bought by Senator Fairbanks of Indiana ten years ago. The loss is over \$750,000.


