## The Des Moines Post Office.

Judge Conner has been receiving many commendatory notices from the press of the State on account of the report that he was opposing Capt. Hull's bill for a \$1,000,000 post office building in Des Moines. While we would be the last to take away from Judge Conner's fame, it is but just to state that the report was unfounded, and untrue. At the time the Des Moines Capital first published this statement, Capt Hull had not submitted his showing to the Committee of Public Buildings and Judge Conner had expressed no opinion for or against the bill. Judge Conner's mind is of too judicial a cast for him to decide questions before they are brought up. When the Des Moines showing is made Judge Conner may be relied upon to do the right thing, he will neither allow the public fund to be unnecessarily expended to assist a candidate for renomination, or will he refuse the reasonable demands of a growing Iowa city on account of political jealousies. In short Judge Conner's vote in the committee will be decided on the merits of the showing made by Des Moines and what can be done for it without injustice to other Iowa cities, and not by narrow personal politics.

Those of our German friends who have been so loyal to the democratic ticket will learn with surprise that it was reserved for Wheeler, a democratic congressman from Kentucky, to complain of the reception planned for Prince Henry. Mr. Wheeler called the German prince, "that little Dutchman" and professed great indignation because President Roosevelt had made arrangements to receive and entertain him as becoming to the representative of a great and friendly nation.

Our democratic friends will say that their party is not responsible for the rabid utterances of a single member of Congress, but it is a further fact that among all the members of the House and Senate not one democratic voice was raised in protest. Boutell and Grosvenor, republicans, spoke denouncing Wheeler's words in vigorous terms, but not a single democrat offered a word of criticism against the man who had with a slur in his voice designated the representative of the German Empire as "that little Dutchman."

We do not blame democracy for the words of the member from Kentucky but we do blame democracy for the fact that not one of their representatives had courage and the decency and the manhood to rise and rebuke the senseless insult.

Democracy would like to make political capital, it would like to exploit the "plain people" business and urge discourtesy to a distinguished visitor because under the laws of his country he is called a prince and occupies the second place in the great empire which next to the United States has made the most remarkable progress in the history of nations.

The Germans of the United States are none the less loyal to the institutions of this country because they have not lost their love for the Fatherland or their reverence for its institutions. None would be more ready to defend republican institutions, none would more willingly offer their lives that the republic might live but none will be more cordial in their welcome to Prince Henry than the German-Americans, they who have lived under the reign of the Hohenzollerns, who loved the old Kaiser, who with the great Bismarck made Germany a world of power, and who honor the present Emperor under whose reign the glory of the father has not dimmed.

The German-Americans believe that no honor is paid to the representative of the Fatherland, and they believe further, that such courtesy will not lower the dignity of this great republic or lessen the love of its people nor its institutions.

For the fourth time the resolution calling for an election to decide on a constitutional amendment providing for the election of U. S. Senators by direct vote of the people has passed the House. We presume the Senate will continue to defeat the measure until public opinion grows so great as to scare the worthy Senators into doing the right thing.

The Grand Army and associated orders should insist that Washington's birthday be properly observed. Let us have a public program and a good old time patriotic revival. Closing the saloons is not all that constitutes a fitting memorial day to the Father of his country, although some people seem to think that is all that is necessary.

For once the business men's association has been put on its feet and is in shape not to be a liberal to its name. Now let us go ahead and do something. A few more factories like the REVIEW plant would do wonders for Denison.

The city council should take active measures at once for enlarging the city boundaries. Denison has out-grown its present limits and it is time to expand.

Captain Schuler's presence is again noticeable in bowling circles, he having fully recovered from his recent illness.

Jack Younger, a well known college sprinter and graduate of the Iowa State college, now residing in Chicago, made his mark in a bowling contest last Monday night. Mr. Younger is a member of the Jewelers league of Chicago and in Monday night's series rolled a score of 288. This breaks the world's record for high individual score in any league game. The record was formerly held by Jordan, also of Chicago's big league. Jordan's score being 287.

The return game between the Vail crack team and the Hamburgers that was to have been rolled here this week has been postponed on account of the illness of "Senator" Cramer, and the absence of Frank Tighe of the Hamburg team.

At a meeting of the executive committee of the Iowa State Bowling association held yesterday in Marshalltown, arrangements were completed for the holding of the next tournament in Dubuque, May 6 to 8 inclusive. Dubuque, Boone, Marshalltown and Des Moines were all candidates for the tournament. Dubuque's offer consisting of free hall for meeting purposes, free supper for delegates and a guarantee of at least \$175 as prize money. The entrance fee for bowlers will be \$3 per man, for both five-men teams and individuals, no two-men teams to be permitted. The prize money will be divided into 60 per cent for five men teams and 20 per cent for individuals. The purse for five-men teams will be divided into three prizes of 60, 30 and 10 per cent, and if more than ten teams enter then four prizes will be given of 50, 25, 15 and 10 per cent each.

Will Denison be one of the towns to enroll in the Iowa state bowling association? We think a team could be

selected among our local bowlers that could make it quite interesting for the "big guns" at the next state tournament. Wright's Hamburgers lost two out of three games to Tamm on the Lane & Leahy alleys last Friday night. All three games were poorly contested. The only feature of the series was Luney's brilliant work in the second game. With Wright's about 20 pins ahead in the last frame, Luney rolled two strikes and nine pins on the third ball, winning the game for Tamm by 11 pins. Score by games:


