**Died.**

At the home of his daughter, Mrs. L. Huff, near Manilla, on Saturday, Feb. 22, 1902, Mr. W. H. Murdock.

The deceased was one of Crawford county's pioneers, coming to Denison in 1874 and purchasing a farm seven miles south-west of town. Mr. Murdock has the distinction of having served in two wars. He served two years under Gen. Scott in the Mexican war and was one of the first in the famous citadel before the fall of the city. He enlisted in the first call for three years and fought in every important battle from Vicksburg to Savannah until the fall of 1865 when he was honorably discharged. Mr. Murdock leaves to mourn three children and a wife to whom he has been married since 1855. The funeral services were held on Monday at the M. E. church in Manilla and the remains laid to rest in the Manilla cemetery.

**Offers the Office to New.**

Washington, Feb. 25.—Harry S. New of Indianapolis has been offered the office of first assistant postmaster general to succeed William M. Johnston of New Jersey, who has resigned. Mr. New has not yet given his final answer. He is a member of the Republican national committee and is the editor of the Indianapolis Journal. The change will occur within the next two months.

**President Commutes Death Sentence.**  
Washington, Feb. 25.—The president has commuted the death sentence in the case of Private Louis Nelson, Ninth cavalry, who was convicted by court martial in the Philippines of embezzlement and desertion with intent to join the enemy, to dishonorable discharge, forfeiture of all pay and allowances and confinement at hard labor in a penitentiary for ten years.
