Court News.

The February term of court was finished on Wednesday and has adjourned. At an evening session on Tuesday Judge Ellwood sentenced Arthur Lentz, mention of whose trial was made in a former issue of this paper. He was sentenced to the penitentiary at Anamosa for three years at hard labor. In pronouncing the sentence the court gave a strong lecture, telling the boy of the enormity of his offense, the disgrace he had brought upon his family and what it would mean to his future life. The limit of the law in a case of this kind is twenty years, but owing to the age of the youth the judge said that he had decided to make it as light as possible. He was taken to Anamosa by Sheriff Bell yesterday morning.

The case of Edna Frances Currier vs Charles Currier was tried to the court on Wednesday. The plaintiff asked for a divorce and the defendant filed a cross petition, also asking for a divorce. The decree was issued in favor of the plaintiff, giving her custody for the children.

The Song Recital.

The musical event of the week has been the song recital given at the Presbyterian church on Tuesday evening by Mrs. Eloise Hicks French, contralto soloist, of Minneapolis. The church was crowded by a most appreciative audience which gave evidence of approbation to each number of the recital. The program had a wide range of choice musical selections happily adapted to the singer's vocal and artistic rendition. Mrs. French is a soloist of excellent training and expression and she has full command of the most difficult notation. She impresses all by her natural and unaffected manner. Rarely have we had the pleasure of listening to a soloist whose articulation is so distinct, every note and word full, rounded, being heard and understood by every listener even in the remotest part of the room. Her manner is pleasing and expressive of musical culture in the highest degree. With perfect ease she ranged her voice with vocal aptitude to the diversified selections, as an evidence of natural talent and most careful tuition. It would seem invidious to name particular songs when the entire program was so choice, but special mention might be made of the Airs, "Lend me your Aid" (Queen of Sheba) by Gonnod; "When Love is Gone" and the "Rosary." Denison is to be congratulated on having such musical events as a pleasure and cultivation to our music loving people. We are pleased also to learn that the ladies did well financially in the entertainment. Special mention is due Miss Agnes King, the piano accompanist, who played the varied and difficult accompaniments with rare skill and fine expression, an evidence of her well known qualifications as a pianist and instructor in music.


