DENISON'S LEADING DEMOCRAT NOMINATED FOR HIGH POSITION

Well Attended Caucus Nominates Minor Officers Also.

The democratic city caucus was held at the City Hall on Wednesday evening and attracted a large crowd of participants and on-lookers. The crowning achievement of the caucus was the nomination of Atty. E. K. Burch for city solicitor. Mr. Burch is one of the leading lawyers of western Iowa, having practiced before the justice courts of this and other townships, and his friends can but rejoice at this worthy recognition of his magnificent abilities. Little did he think when he left the republican party in '96 that democracy would so appreciate his humble services as within a few short years to place him in nomination for this magnificent office. It is no wonder that his breast swelled with manly pride, that his eyes gleamed with the light of victory and that his soaring forehead soared to yet more exalted heights. When some future historian shall write of the great men of Denison there will be found upon the glittering pages these words: "E. K. Burch, the man for whom Diogenes was looking. Candidate for city solicitor in 1902."

The democrats of Denison feel that Mr. Burch has honored them by accepting a place on their ticket, and will do their utmost, not only to elect him, but for the election of the minor officers who were pleased to be on the ticket with so distinguished a citizen.

Mr. John T. Carey accepted the unanimous nomination for mayor with all the blushing coyness of the old maid when she says, "Oh, this is so sudden." Mr. Carey has not been a candidate before, this year, for any office. Mr. Carey is a good citizen and an honorable and upright man, he has, however, formed the candidate habit, and it is a hard one to break, in fact he has been so frequently before the people that at every county election now it is customary to find some democratic ballots headed by Andrew Jackson and ended by John T. Carey. Had the republicans nominated a man whose election would have constituted a danger to the welfare of Denison or who was unfit for the office there would have been some excuse for Mr. Carey's allowing his name to again come before the people, but under the circumstances, considering the fact that Mr. Jackson would make a model mayor in every respect and is well fitted for the office both by natural ability and by education, there is no excuse for Mr. Carey to make a martyr of himself as he informs his friends he is doing. Under the circumstances we must take Mr. Carey's statements with a grain of salt, and be led to the opinion that poor, dear John has an itch for office that nothing but perpetual candidacy will satisfy.

Mr. J. P. Jones is the candidate for

treasurer. He is a good man, honest and up right, and will undoubtedly receive his party vote. He has always been a loyal democrat, as many democratic candidates have had occasion to know.

Mr. F. J. Branaka, the bright young employe of the Bulletin office was nominated for assessor. While pleased with the recognition, he himself regards the matter a joke, and would probably be the most surprised and disappointed man in Denison should he be elected. At the caucus he stated, in effect, that on account of republican prosperity he was busily engaged all the time at steady employment and that he did not desire the position. He was nominated, however, in spite of his protest.

For alderman Mr. Andy Bowling, a good and industrious citizen was nominated in the first ward. This was merely a matter of compliment as no one expects that he will be elected. In the second ward as was expected, Mr. Thos. McGrin was accorded re-nomination. When seen at his office on Main street Mr. McGrin stated that he hoped to be elected, and that if he was would do his best to serve the people. We have nothing to say against his candidacy, but we believe that the people of the second ward would prefer to be represented by the bright, industrious young man, Philip Lochmiller. We understand that Mr. B. J. Sibbert has declined the nomination for alderman from the third ward and that Mr. Herman Grill has been selected by the committee to make the race for the second time. Mr. Wygant should receive a handsome majority although we have nothing unkind to say of Mr. Grill.

Judging from the caucus we would say that there are but two men on the ticket whom the Democrats themselves have any hopes of electing. They are John T. Carey and Thos. McGrin. We know that certain elements of the town are prepared to throw all their efforts and energy into the campaign for Mr. Carey. It remains to be seen how far this will affect the result. The Second Ward has always been close, but we believe that with intelligent effort on the part of Republicans it can be carried this year for their splendid candidate.

We again wish to congratulate Democracy upon the selection of Mr.

Burch for the important position of solicitor. He is a man whom it is a joy to see and a pleasure to converse with. His abilities in certain lines are unequalled and his versatility of conduct unexcelled. Since the time of the importation of the Hon. J. L. Barter Democracy has done no more creditable thing.
