

Congressional Convention.
A delegate convention of the Republicans of the Tenth Congressional District, is hereby called to convene at Ft. Dodge, Iowa, on Tuesday, May 13, 1902, at 9 o'clock a. m. for the purpose of placing in nomination a candidate for congress to succeed Hon. J. P. Conner for the term commencing March 4, 1903. The basis of representation is one delegate for each county and one delegate for each 200 votes or fraction over 100 cast for Hon. A. B. Cammins for Governor at the election in November, 1901. The counties of the Tenth Congressional District cast the following vote and are entitled to delegates as follows:

It is so long since the Bulletin has had a chance to crow that we cannot find it in our heart to criticize its superabundance of blow because the republicans of Denison saw fit to elect a democratic mayor.

The REVIEW feels quite puffed up to find that it is the whole show in Denison republican politics and that it alone was defeated in the mayoralty contest. The REVIEW had regarded itself simply as an exponent of the republicans of the city.

The Bulletin may think it has won a great victory but its policy in sacrificing all the rest of the democratic ticket in order to elect Carey has left some spots which it will take a long time to heal. The REVIEW fights for the republican ticket, not for some special favorites.

It is reported that Hon. George T. Roberts of Fort Dodge, director of the mint, has purchased the Iowa State Register of the Clarksons. The price to be paid is \$150,000. This includes the building. Should this report be true the Register will again take first rank in the field of Iowa journalism.

It is so seldom that the democrats nominate a really first class man for any office that when they do there are always a lot of republicans who run over each other in their zeal to vote for the monstrosity. A good man on the republican ticket is no novelty and so does not attract so much attention.

Recently at Guthrie, Okla., a newspaper plant was burned out. The editor only carried a small insurance. Within six days the business men of that place raised by subscription \$50,000 and offered it to the unfortunate editor who refused to accept the large sum only as a loan. This shows that a good newspaper is appreciated.

Secretary Shaw has appointed Mr. Robert B. Armstrong, an Iowa man as his private secretary Mr. Armstrong is a bright young man of considerable experience. He is the Chicago correspondent to the New York Herald, and was political writer for the Record Herald in Chicago. He has only lately returned from a short European tour.

In another column we publish the speech of Hon. J. P. Conner in the House of Representatives, opposing the bill to place the rural carriers under a contract system. Judge Conner made one of the principle speeches in opposition to the measure and the fact that it did not pass although recommended by the committee is evidence not only of the good sense of the congressmen but of the effect of Judge Conner's eloquence. The benefits of rural free delivery should be extended as rapidly as possible to all the farmers in the populous districts and not to a favored few.

The new mayor and council are now facing the appointment problem. Two loyal republicans are candidates before the council for street commissioner. A. C. Weeks and Wm. Gilbreath are both capable men and the REVIEW is thoroughly satisfied after careful investigation that both were loyal to the ticket this spring and worked for its success. Retman is a candidate for marshal, but the fact that he was a supporter of Jackson for mayor may operate against him. We understand that Ringer and Baer are both candidates for re-appointment. Upon the personnel of the police force depends much of the success of a city administration. We believe Mr. Carey knows this and that he will be careful in his selections and be governed by the fitness of the candidate and not by his political pull. Should he show this spirit, as we have faith that he will, the REVIEW pledges its support in favor of the best possible police force for Denison.

NEW PARTY IS LAUNCHED

Embraces Reformers of Varying Shades of Political Belief.

POPULISTS DICTATE RESULTS.

They Christen It Allied People's Party and Retain Their National Committee Intact—Platform Declares in Favor of Money Based on Entire Wealth.

Louisville, April 4.—Under the name of the Allied People's Party of the United States, a new political organization was formed here yesterday, composed of reform elements opposed to the Democratic and Republican parties. The platform of the new organization embodies the platform adopted at the conference held at Kansas City last September, when a call for a convention was issued "to unite the reform forces against plutocracy." It reaffirms the spirit of the declaration of principles adopted at the national conventions of the People's Party in St. Louis, Omaha and Cincinnati, and the demand for the initiative and referendum and the government ownership of all public utilities are its principal planks.

While the People's Party, the fusion Populists, the Socialists, the Referendum League, the Union Labor party, Public Ownership party, the Prohibition party and the United Christian party were represented on the floor of the convention, by accredited or by volunteer delegates, only two organizations, the People's Party and the Public Ownership party, had given their delegates any authority to form an alliance. It is the hope, however, of the Allied People's Party that other reform forces will later decide to unite with the new organization.

The convention was practically dominated by the People's Party. At times discussions of a lively nature took place and for a while it seemed as though the movement was about to fail, owing to the unwillingness of a number of the People's Party delegates to make any concessions to the other reform forces present.

Under the plan of organization adopted the national committee of the People's Party, with Jo A. Parker as its chairman, will remain intact, with the addition of three more members from Missouri, who will have one-half a vote apiece until the next national convention, this being a concession to the reform forces of that state. This committee will have power to call a national convention and its headquarters will be situated wherever the chairman desires, except three months before an election, when they will be in St. Louis.

The differences between the platform adopted by the convention and that recommended by the platform committee are very slight. In the plank on money the platform adopted favors scientific money based upon the entire wealth of the people of the nation and not redeemable in any specific commodity, but to be legal tender for all debts, public and private, and to be issued by the government only and without the intervention of banks, sufficient in quantity to meet the requirements of commerce.
