

ELKINS TO BE RELEASED.

Set Free After Over Twelve Years of
Illegal Imprisonment.
John Wesley Elkins, who confessed
to the murder of his father and step-
mother when he was 11 years of age, is
to be released from the state prison at
Anamosa, after 12 years and 3 months
of what is admitted to have been illegal
incarceration. It is now well under-
stood that the imprisonment was with-
out warrant of law, as the courts have
held repeatedly that a child under 14
years of age is presumably incapable
of crime. His application for a parole
has been the subject of an exciting
contest in the state senate and has ex-
cited attention throughout the state.
The parole is granted by the majority
of one vote. The crime was the result
of continued alleged excessive punish-
ment by his father, in which he was
aided by the stepmother. During his
incarceration Elkins has managed to
secure an education much beyond
most young men of his age, and ap-
pears to be animated by the hope of
final release, which he endeavored to
merit by a clean prison record and
personal improvement.

Pension for Mrs. McKinley.

A bill granting a pension of \$5,000
per year to Mrs. Wm. McKinley passed
the House of Representatives on Sat-
urday. It had previously passed the
Senate and now goes to the President
for his signature. Many of the south-
ern representatives were much in
favor of the bill. Mr. Richardson of
Tennessee and Kleberg of Texas both
spoke upon its passage. Mr. Kle-
berg saying that if for no other
reason this pension should be allowed,
because President McKinley wiped out
the last vestige of sectionalism. As
one who has "worn the grey" he
joined in this act of justice to the
widow of one who had "worn the blue."
