### The High Price of Meats.

Secretary of agriculture, James Wilson, attributes the high price of fresh meats at present to the scarcity of fat cattle, rather than to the manipulations of the meat trust and packers. He holds that the high prices are a result of feeding fifty and sixty cent corn to cattle and hogs the past winter, and fears there will be no relief for the coming two months, or until the grass feed stock can be got onto the market. Retail butchers are helpless, and have either to maintain present prices or go out of business. At prevailing prices the profits are far less than when they could sell meats at from four to six cents less than they are now charging. Poultry, eggs, butter and other food products are kept up in price in sympathy with the prices on meats, but there does not seem to be any good reason why these conditions should last. At least, the masses of the people—the consumers—will hope that normal prices may rule again in the near future. The farmers who seem to be having things pretty much their own way just now, (whatever may be the causes), are not complaining. In fact, they are happy and complaisant, and cannot be blamed for enjoying the ill-wind that blows them so much good under present conditions.—Webster City Freeman.

The Cedar Rapids Republican of recent date had occasion to note the promotion of a clerk in a railroad office in Cedar Rapids. The young man was industrious and intelligent, had always worked faithfully and was getting \$25 per month. He received an offer from another road at an advance in salary. His worthiness was brought to the notice of the Republican and in noting his promotion called attention to these things. A local contemporary came out and declared the Republican had aroused the ire of the railroad official by giving half a column to the resignation of a \$25 00 clerk. The Republican gets back and says:
