Welcome to Conner.

Crawford county should make Judge Conner's home coming and renomination notable events. He returns having made a splendid record to meet a united party and none but friends throughout his district. No district in Iowa has ever had a congressman who accomplished larger results or made a more favorable impression during his first term. The REVIEW is frank to state that it hopes that Judge Conner's second term will not be his last. It believes that his long years of training as an attorney, as a business man, as one of the most fearless and impartial of judges and finally his service in Congress make him the best man in the 10th District to represent the people, to deal fairly with parties and factions and personal and public interests and we firmly believe that each succeeding term will add geometrically to his usefulness and strength. While we thank the other counties of the district for their loyal support of Judge Conner still we feel that the debt is not entirely ours but that the district will gladly acknowledge that it owes much to Crawford for presenting the name of one who has so successfully represented the interests of all. The public career of Denison's two representatives at Washington should be a source of pride to every citizen of this county. To some of us falls the lot of remaining at home to carry on the dreary drudgery of daily toil, but all of us can help by advice and loyalty and perhaps even by self-sacrifice in maintaining the honors which they have won and in which we have a share. No man has ever succeeded in public or private life without the help of friends. Especially is this true in the political world. Crawford has succeeded of late years because of his unswerving loyalty to the man of the hour. So long as the republicans of this county stand as a unit, rallying with loyalty and devotion to the standard of the one whose interest at the time chances to be paramount so long will the chances of success be largely in their favor. The REVIEW is not scolding or even preaching, it is not necessary, it is the magnificent record of Crawford county republicans along this very line which has brought such victories in the past and which has made Crawford county a center of political influence and importance throughout state and nation.

Gov. Shaw said a true thing at the Grant banquet at Philadelphia last Saturday when he said that the necessity for strong governmental control was doing more to break down the doctrine of states rights than all the fine theories ever spun or even than the victorious armies of the Civil war. Some people whether living north or south of Mason and Dixon's line have been gradually forced to the position that only under a strong central government can this county live and prosper. Commercialism has taught us the lesson that Webster failed to teach. If business of all kinds can be better conducted under one head, if combination and centralization are desirable in the business world why not in the governmental world.

The Pinnacle of Fame.

Our distinguished fellow townsmen the Secretary of the Treasury has finally reached the top-most notch of fame. His admirers here felt jubilant when he was elected Governor, their enthusiasm knew no bounds when he was made Secretary of the Treasury, but now that "Judge" has made Shaw, and Shaw alone the subject for its front page cartoon it is felt that the highest possible tribute has been paid. The first page of "Judge" is reserved for great men and great issues. To figure ever so inconspicuously on that holy of holies is a recognition accorded but few. The cartoon of Secretary Secretary Shaw is not a bad one from an artistic standpoint but it does him the injustice of insinuating that he is plotting for President Roosevelt's chair. Secretary Shaw is a man of Presidential timber. He is big enough and brainy enough. If the people wanted a man who combined the energy of the west with the conservatism of the east no better man could be found. But the Secretary is not the man to plot or to let the finger of ambition still the voice of prudence or chill the warmth of gratitude. The honors that have come to him have come because he was just that sort of a man. President Roosevelt will find in his new Secretary of the Treasury an unselfish adviser and friend, not a man who will make use of the honor bestowed upon him to under mine its source.

Hurray for Boone and Conner.

Denison sends greeting to Boone and congratulates that thriving and enterprising city upon the fact that it is now safely launched on the way toward securing a \$100,000 federal building. Boone is in every way worthy of such recognition. It is a splendid center of industry and is bound to become one of the best towns in prosperous Iowa. The friends of Judge Conner feel that this recognition of the second largest city in his district is a great personal victory, as there were hundreds of cities that were disappointed. Of course this is not all of a congressman's duty. It does not touch upon the larger field of national policy, but it is nevertheless one of the congressional duties and an important one to look after the interests of his district and its thriving cities. The fact that Judge Conner has been able to secure this before the completion of his first full term in Congress, speaks volumes for the energy and ability with which he has urged the claims of Boone.

Boone and the whole Tenth District are rapidly finding out that in Judge Conner they have a Congressman who is able, strong, aggressive where aggression is necessary and proper, and always on the alert to do for his district. Again we congratulate Boone and we venture that at the coming ratification meeting at Fort Dodge. No delegation will be more enthusiastic for the renomination of Hon. J. P. Conner than the delegates from Boone county.
