

Welcome Home.
Denison gives welcome to Judge Conner on his return from Washington and assures him that it has watched his career in the national congress, with interest and pride. It has been glad to note the rapidity with which he has taken his place among the influential, newer members of Congress. The effectiveness with which he has accomplished results and the earnestness with which he has safeguarded the interests of the people. Denison points with pride to the fact that he is one of the few men who return to find a unanimous and undivided district. It points with pride that in his home county he has none but friends and that these friends are just as loyal and just as earnest in his behalf as they were at Fort Dodge two years ago.

Denison also points with pride to the fact that upon each return its Congressman finds Denison a better town, that there are no vacant homes nor idle hands in Denison, that business conditions are good and that the people are healthy, happy and law-abiding. The convention to-morrow promises to be a love feast attended by republican workers from all over the county irrespective of their being delegates or not. It will choose an enthusiastic delegation to go to Fort Dodge on Tuesday and express in strongest terms its approval of republican doctrines and the able manner in which they have been upheld by the Congressman from the 10th Iowa District.

Congressman and Mrs. J. P. Conner will arrive in Denison tomorrow morning. Judge Conner will address the republican county convention on Saturday afternoon and will remain in this city until Monday, when he goes to Fort Dodge to be present at the Congressional convention. We understand that he will return to Washington immediately after the 13th and that Mrs. Conner will remain in Denison for the summer. Mrs. Conner's many friends will be glad indeed to learn that she is to again be with us.

The Cedar Rapids papers are having quite a jangle regarding some cyclones news. It seems that the Gazette telegraphed to the Jefferson Souvenir for detailed account of the cyclone near Jefferson, and the Souvenir's message was delivered to the Cedar Rapids Republican. The Republican immediately printed the story, thus scooping the Gazette.

COPELAND PUT ON TRIAL.

He is Charged With Murder of A. C. Rodgers, a Traveling man.

Green River, Wyo., May 7.—Ned C. Copeland was put on trial today for the murder of A. C. Rodgers, a traveling man for Swift & Co. with headquarters at St. Joseph, on a train near this city several years ago. Copeland was at one time teller of the Nebraska National bank at Omaha, and with his disappearance from that city \$10,000 of the bank's money was missed. The bond company was searching for Copeland at the time. Copeland's attorneys will make a plea of insanity, and his relatives are making a strong effort in his behalf. Rodgers' friends are making an equally strong effort to secure a conviction and are lending all the assistance possible to the prosecution. At the time of the shooting Copeland claimed Rodgers had hounded him from San Francisco, and had a strange influence over him that Copeland could not shake off.

G. A. R. STATE ENCAMPMENT

THREE DAYS MEETING AT
DES MOINES MAY 20-22

The Program is Completed and a Great Reunion is Expected. Speeches by Noted Veterans.

The G. A. R. state encampment to be held May 20-22 promises to be a great reunion of comrades. A public reception will be tendered the visitors Tuesday afternoon at the state capitol, and Tuesday evening, May 23, there will be a camp fire at the auditorium, presided over by Gen. Josiah Given, late chief justice of Iowa, a veteran of the Mexican and Civil wars. At this camp fire there will be addresses of welcome by Gov. Cummins and Mayor Brenton and responses by Department Commander George Metzgar and Commander-in-Chief Ell Torrance. There will also be an address by Gov. Van Sant of Minnesota, formerly and for many years a resident of Iowa.

The encampment proper will begin Wednesday morning, and there also will be meetings of the W. R. C. and all auxiliary bodies. In the afternoon the annual parade will take place. Following this there will be reunions as follows: Second Iowa Infantry, Fourth Iowa volunteers, Fourth Iowa cavalry, Fifth Iowa cavalry, Twenty-seventh Iowa volunteers, Thirty-fourth Iowa volunteers, Crocker's Iowa brigade, survivors of Vicksburg campaign and survivors of Mexican war.

On Wednesday evening at a general camp fire Gen. G. M. Dodge is to give his "Personal Recollections of Gen. William T. Sherman." On the same evening the Spanish-American war veterans hold a reunion, to be addressed by W. G. Dows, W. B. Emerson, A. L. Sorter, Josiah Given and W. S. H. Matthews. The Former Prisoners of War association will hold a meeting at the same time, addressed by Gen. Andrew Geddis, M. T. Russell, S. H. M. Byers and S. H. Hedrick.
