### ORGANIZE BROKERAGE COMPANY

Southwest Iowa Men Combine for Business.

Missouri Valley Iowa, May 15.—One leading merchant from each of the following towns in Western Iowa and eastern Nebraska met in this city on Tuesday and formed an organization called the Iowa Brokerage company: Carroll, Harlan, Wall Lake, Moorehead, Denison, Neola, Ida Grove, Woodbine, Mapleton, Whiting, Mo. Valley and Holstein in Iowa and Blair, Nebraska, were the towns represented.

The object of the company is to transact a general brokerage business for the benefit of the members of the company. All orders for goods will be sent to the president of the company, who will purchase the goods in carload lots and distribute them from a central point. It is expected that by reason of buying the goods in such large quantities that the company will be able to get bed-rock prices from the wholesale houses.

The following officers were elected for the ensuing year: Ben H. Gavitt, of Missouri Valley, president and general manager; Joseph Beh, of Harlan, vice-president; H. Gibert, of Denison, secretary and treasurer. Lyman Whittier, Whiting, C. C. Williams, Ida Grove, H. Gibert, Denison, B. H. Gavitt, Missouri Valley and Joseph Beh, Harlan, compose the first board of Directors. The new concern will commence operation at once and the outcome will be watched with interest by many other cities in the same field—Nonparalel.
