Just as was expected, the Bulletin throws a four column fit over the last republican convention. It makes a great play about snap judgement, but the facts are, that it was at first purposed to hold the convention to select delegates at the time of the convention which selected the congressional delegates, but for the very purpose of fairness and at the request of Judge Elwood's friends, the convention was postponed. Thus, the Elwood men were given every opportunity for a fair hearing. Their campaign lasted from before the congressional convention in May until June 2d. Judge Elwood had been in the county several days making a house to house canvass of the county, before the convention was called. The fact that every precinct but two was represented, speaks for itself, that the republicans were interested, that they knew what they were about and acted with intelligent judgement, after learning all the facts. The Review has not attempted to conceal the fact that there was a difference of opinion among the republicans of the county as to the best course to pursue, but the evident glee of the Bulletin over what it hails as a "republican row" should serve as a warning and a caution, and put a bridle upon the tongues of the intemperate of speech.

The republicans of Crawford have worked together too many times for them to allow any differences growing out of the last convention, to enter deep into the souls of either party. There was not a leader on either side of the late contest who has not received support and friendship from those opposed to him, few who will not expect future favors, and if they are either mindful of the past or regardful of the future, they must know that rancor and strife bring no rewards except bitterness and disappointments.

There are three impressions which we wish to correct:

1st. There was no "snap convention," as Judge Elwood and his friends knew, for five weeks that there was to be a convention and that the call would be made for the early days of June. It was also understood as has been done, that the district convention would be called for June 17.

2d. The last convention was a calm and deliberate expression of the judgment of a very large majority of the republicans of Crawford county. Never were caucuses more largely attended, nor a convention at which no county officers were to be nominated, more fully representative of every precinct of the county—we greatly doubt if our democratic friends will be able to show such a large and representative convention when their turn comes.

3d. Crawford county is not "against Judge Elwood." The only possible enemies he has made were made during the past few weeks. If Judge Elwood is nominated there will be no regrets on the part of any Crawford county republican. Had the Judge been guided by the judgement of his best friends he would have left Crawford alone to form its own policy, and his interests would probably have been much better protected than they are at present, but even as the case now stands, Crawford is not "against" Elwood. It is for fair dealing with its friends, it believes in protecting Crawford County's interests first, as against those of any other county, or any other district, it believes in helping those who help it, but it is unfair and not representative of the feeling of the last convention to say that it is "against" Judge Elwood.

The school year having just closed we wish to pay our measure of well merited praise to the corps of teachers who have made it a success. Denison has a splendid corps of instructors and under the careful and capable management of Prof. H. E. Savage the work has been pursued with satisfaction to pupils and parents. Prof. Savage has the happy faculty of governing without friction, of overcoming difficult situations without embarrassments, of getting the best possible work done with the forces at his command, and of conducting himself in such a way as to inspire the esteem and confidence. He is an ideal school man, an ideal man too. The increased salary voted him by the board was fully justified and Denison may consider itself fortunate if it is able to retain his services for any length of time. There is another of the high school force of whom we wish to speak. Miss Emma Rollinson has now been connected with our schools for a number of years. She has been the most successful high school teacher in gaining and retaining the affections of her pupils, that Denison has ever had. Bright, capable, energetic, of splendid character and charming both in mind and person Miss Rollinson is almost a sine qua non in our high school. We are glad that she is to remain for another year and we feel that the school board has set a good example with Prof. Savage which it ought to follow with Miss Rollinson.
