

Church Organist Commits a Horrible Suicide in Front of the Altar.
Bay City, Mich., June 10.—After saturating his clothing with kerosene oil, Joseph Rejch set fire to himself in the Catholic church at Fisherville, this county. His charred remains were discovered in front of the altar. Holes had been burned through the church floor by his blazing body. Rejch, who was thirty-nine years of age, was the organist of the church and a teacher in the Sunday school. It is supposed he was temporarily insane.
